County Project and Issue Update Volume 18 June 2016

Regional Collaboration Efforts – Economic Development: On June 14th, Genevieve Coady, Executive Director of the Jefferson County Economic Development Consortium (JCEDC) and Ben Wehmeier, Jefferson County Administrator presented information regarding the proposed Glacial Heritage Development Partnership to county municipalities. Municipalities represented on the 14th were: Cities of Beaver Dam; Horicon; Mayville; Fox Lake and Waupun. Town representation included the Towns of Hustisford and Rubicon. The Village of Hustisford was also represented. Executive Director Coady outlined the proposal and three partnership scenarios for potential consideration as of January 2017.

Also in attendance were Dodge County Executive Committee members Russell Kottke; Dave Frohling; Donna Maly; MaryAnn Miller and Dennis Schmidt.

Mid-Wisconsin Federated Library System (MWFLS): The Merger Study Committee is scheduled to meet on June 16^{th.} The full MWFLS Board is meeting on June 28th at which time it is anticipated the agenda will include an official vote on the proposed system merger between MWFLS and the Eastern Shores Library System. County Board action will be requested at either the July 19th or August 16th meeting. It is my understanding the Washington County Board will take formal action at their August meeting. If the proposed merger is approved by all county boards (Dodge / Washington / Ozaukee / Sheboygan) it will become effective January 1, 2017.

Human Service Director Recruitment: A total of 12 applications were received for the vacancy. Four candidates were interviewed on June 8th. The interview team consisted of Human Service & Health Board Chair Mary Bobholz; Human Resource & Labor Negotiations Chair Joe Marsik, Human Resource Director Sarah Eske and me. An adjoining county assisted with the interview questions. Two finalist have been selected and will be brought back for second interviews along with a meet and greet session for employees, Human Service & Health Board members and County Board Supervisors. The meet and greet session is scheduled at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday July 6th at the Henry Dodge Office Building. The goal is to present a Resolution confirming the appointment as part of the July 19th County Board agenda.

2015 Audited Financial Statements: Representatives of Johnson Block and Company Inc. are scheduled to present and review the 2015 Dodge County Financial Statements with Independent Auditor' Report to a joint meeting of the Finance Committee and Health Facilities Committee on Tuesday July 12th. Subject to confirmation, a presentation to the full County Board will be scheduled for either July 19th or August 16th.

2017 Budget Timeline: The Finance Committee has reviewed and approved the attached timeline. (reverse side). Please note the mini-budget sessions scheduled for Tuesday September 27 through Thursday September 29th. The sessions are scheduled to begin at 4:00 p.m. Each meeting is open to the public and your attendance is encouraged. The other meeting of note, is Tuesday October 25th. This is a Special Finance Committee meeting to review the proposed budget and submit amendments in advance of the November 15th budget meeting. Please mark your calendars.

RE: 2015 levy dollars returned to the general fund

I am pleased to report to you that the Dodge County Sheriff's Office returned \$57,589 of its 2015 budget to the general fund. In addition, a budget amendment of \$510,289 that was approved by the county board in December was not needed and was never allocated to our budget. I would like to lay out for you some basic information on how we got to this at the end of the year amidst a very difficult year.

Mid-Year Monitoring

As any organization should, our administration payed very close attention to the dollars expended and the revenues coming in. This process started early in the year to ensure we monitored and made adjustments for any unforeseen budgetary difficulties. As a result of this monitoring, we identified several potential issues and began taking steps to make adjustments in a desire to live within our means. Some of those issues resulted from unbudgeted wage increases, a significant decline in contract bed revenue in our detention facility, and difficulties in monitoring overtime expenditures. The difficulty in monitoring those overtime expenditures was due to a scheduling software which was incapable of projecting accurate comp time payouts that were likely to occur late in the year. These issues all have been or are in the process of being addressed so we can be more accurate in our projections for the 2016 budget year.

Proactive Measures to Remedy

As a result of the above listed issues and other budget difficulties, the sheriff's office took significant steps to cut expenses. We also worked very closely with the US Marshall Service and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) in locating contract detainees to fill the budgeted bed space in our detention facility. During that process excellent working relationships were developed and communications improved between our agencies. This resulted in a significant increase in contracting that began during November and December of 2015 and continues as of today's date. We also worked with our Information Technology Department to transition from the scheduling software that we were using to another software already being utilized in the county, which hopefully will aid in better projected personnel costs during the year.

Budget Amendment

In late 2015, based on information that was available at the time and with limited knowledge of where our contracted revenues would end up, the decision was made to approach the County Board with the budget amendment. The thought process at the time was that we wanted to be upfront and keep the tax payers informed rather than hide the problem until the budget year was over. This approach allowed us to ask for the additional funds we believed we would need in advance of spending it, rather than asking for the money after it was already spent. The County Board approved the budget adjustment in the amount of \$510,289.

Close of Books

Upon final review of the 2015 books with Dodge County Finance Director Julie Kolp, we found that the significant expenditure cuts and year end revenue stabilization brought us out of a budget deficit and allowed us to end the year with the surplus of \$57,589. I am pleased that we were able to live within our means and make the necessary adjustments throughout the year to account for circumstances that presented themselves.

In closing I am thrilled to report that as of the end of May we have an average of 272 contracted detainees through the first 5 months of the year. This is well above the budgeted contract number of 235 detainees per day. We are currently in an excellent position for the remainder of 2016 and we are optimistic that we will be able to continue that success into the future.

Mr. Mielke then appointed Gary Schmidt to fill a vacancy on the Aging Disability Resource Center Governing Board for a term to expire on July 14, 2018. A motion to accept the appointment was made by Supervisor Duchac and seconded by Supervisor Nickel. The motion passed by acclamation with no negative votes cast, thereby approving the appointment.

Claim No. 1 A claim by Erin A. McConley for money damages in the amount of \$4,553.74, for costs to repair a 2013 Honda Civic automobile (automobile) was received in the Office of the Dodge County Clerk on March 31, 2016. The claim arises from an incident that is alleged to have occurred on March 23, 2016, at or about 1:30 p.m., wherein Ms. McConley was operating the automobile eastbound on W. State Street, near its intersection with Spring Street, in the City of Fox Lake, Dodge County, Wisconsin, and wherein at or near the same time, and at or near the same location, an employee of the Dodge County Highway Department was operating a plow truck owned by the Dodge County Highway Department, and wherein while the plow truck operator was backing up the plow truck, in a northerly direction, on Spring Street, at its intersection with W. State Street, the rear of the plow truck and the front bumper and hood of the automobile collided, and thereby damaged the front bumper and the hood of the automobile, and the cost to repair this damage is \$4,553.74. RESOLUTION NO. 16-13

PROPOSED SPEED ZONE DECLARATION ON COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAY SYSTEM

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF DODGE COUNTY, WISCONSIN Members:

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT

This Agreement entered into between the City of Watertown, a Wisconsin Municipal Corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Watertown," and Dodge County Wisconsin, hereinafter referred to as "County."

WITNESSETH:

Whereas the Highway 16 By-pass is partially located within the corporate limits of Watertown and in Dodge County, and

Whereas Watertown has been negotiating with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to reduce the speed limit along the entire length of the by-pass from 55 miles per hour down to 45 miles per hour, and

Whereas the Wistonsin Department of Transportation will consent to the reduction in speed limit only if the Police Departments of the County and Watertown agree that one police agency shall be responsible for the patrolling and enforcing of the speed limit on the by-pass:

NOW THEREFORE IT IS HEREBY AGREED BETWEEN THE PARTIES HERETO AS FOLLOWS:

1. That the Police Department of Watertown hereby agrees, based upon the approval obtained from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, that it shall have sole responsibility for the patrolling and enforcement of the speed limit on the Highway 16 by-pass located within the Corporate City limits of Watertown and in the Town of Emmet, Dodge County, Wisconsin.

- 2. In addition, if motor vehicle accidents should occur in the Dodge County portion of the Highway 16 by-pass, the Watertown Police Department and/or Watertown EMS representatives will respond to those accidents.
- 3. During the term of this Agreement the City will remain solely responsible for its Police Officers and in the event they are injured while patrolling in the Dodge County portion of the by-pass, the City will provide coverage to the officers under its health insurance policy and workers compensation policy. The County shall not be liable in any way for actions of the City's officers in their enforcement responsibility under this agreement. The City agrees that it will indemnify and hold harmless the County, its agents, officers and employees, against all liabilities, losses, damages, costs and expenses including any attorneys fees and expenses, from any causes of actions, suits, claims, demands, judgments, awards and settlements resulting from any injury to or death of any person or damaged property and made by any third party or any city police officer against the county as a result of the City's enforcement responsibility under this agreement.
- 4. Any citations that are issued by the City's officers in the Dodge County portion of the by-pass shall be processed through the City's Municipal Court, being expressly agreed by the parties hereto that the Watertown Municipal Court will have venue to hear the cases issued as set forth herein.
- 5. This Agreement shall remain in full force and effect until revoked by either party to this Agreement by providing 30 days advanced written notice to the other. If both parties elect to terminate the agreement it may be done so upon execution of a written termination agreement without any advance notice.

6. This Agreement is being entered into by the parties pursuant to Section 66.0301 Wis. Stats. which authorizes the execution of intergovernmental cooperation agreements.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

Between the Dodge County, WI Sheriff's Office and the Watertown, WI Police Department Relating to an Intergovernmental Agreement between the City of Watertown and Dodge County regarding traffic enforcement on the Highway 16 By-Pass.

IT IS AGREED THAT:

- 1. MUTUAL ASSISTANCE REOUESTS Requests for mutual assistance (mutual aid) shall be governed by § 59.28(2) and 66.0313, Wisc. Stats. They may be made by police radio, telephone, or teletype, however, the verbiage "requesting mutual aid" must be used. If the request is made by police radio or telephone, the Dodge County S.O. supervisor will, if deemed appropriate, make the necessary request orally and a confirming teletype will be sent to the Watertown Police Department as soon as practical.
- 2. SPEED ENFORCEMENT Notwithstanding the language in paragraph one of the Intergovernmental Agreement that "The Police Department of Watertown . . . shall have sole responsibility for the patrolling and enforcement of the speed limit on the Highway 16 by-pass located within the Corporate City limits of Watertown and in the Town of Emmet . . .", logic would dictate that officers of the Town of Emmet, deputies from the Dodge County Sheriff's Office, and the Wisconsin State Patrol can, and should, engage in speed enforcement when they are present and able to do so.
- 3. CRASH RESPONSE / INVESTIGATION Motor vehicle crashes which occur on the Dodge County portion of the by-pass will be responded to and investigated by the Watertown Police Department, however, this action will require that Dodge County S.O. request mutual aid. Furthermore, crashes which have or most probably will have felony implications will be investigated by the Dodge County Sheriff's Department.
- 4. OWI ARRESTS AND CRIMES If an OWI arrest is contemplated by a City of Watertown Officer as a result of violations occurring on the Dodge County portion of the by-pass, Dodge County S.O. shall be notified immediately so that mutual aid can be requested by them. Confirming tests should not begin until mutual aid has been requested.

City of Watertown officers who become aware of a crime being committed on the Dodge County portion of the by-pass will immediately notify Dodge County S.O. so that mutual aid can be requested by them. An arrest should not be initiated until mutual aid has been requested.

5. ANCILLARY CITATIONS - Forfeiture-related citations resulting from traffic stops by City of Watertown officers on the Dodge County portion of the by-pass will be processed through the Watertown Municipal Court. Citations of a criminal traffic nature will be processed through the Dodge County Circuit Court.

- 6. <u>PURSUITS</u> Pursuits initiated by City of Watertown officers that result from violations observed on the Dodge County portion of the by-pass shall be handled in accordance with Chapter 41.2.2 of the Watertown Police Department Manual. The Dodge County Sheriff's Office shall immediately be notified of the pursuit so that mutual aid can be requested by them.
- 7. MODIFICATION / TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT This Memorandum of Understanding may be modified at any time with the agreement of both parties. It will automatically stop with the termination of the original Intergovernmental Agreement or any successor agreements.

WHEREAS, Watertown and the County are parties to that certain Agreement dated July 12, 2002, (the "Intergovernmental Agreement"), relating to, among other matters, patrolling and speed enforcement along and about the Highway 16 By-Pass just beyond but contiguous to the corporate limits of Watertown; and

WHEREAS, Watertown and the County are further parties to that certain Memorandum of Understanding dated August 17, 2002, (the "MOU"), incorporating by reference the within-described Intergovernmental Agreement regarding traffic enforcement on the Highway 16 By-Pass just beyond but contiguous to the corporate limits of Watertown; and

WHEREAS, Watertown and the County have since and now determined that it is in their mutual best interests to terminate said Intergovernmental Agreement and release each other from any existing or continuing obligation or liability arising thereunder; and

WHEREAS, Watertown and the County specifically and jointly elect to terminate the Intergovernmental Agreement as enabled and provided for under said Intergovernmental Agreement at Paragraph 5 as of the date first written above;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants hereinafter set forth, other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which is acknowledged, and, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Termination of the Intergovernmental Agreement</u>. As of the Effective Date first written above, the Intergovernmental Agreement is terminated having no further force or effect;
- 2. Termination of the Memorandum of Understanding. As of the Effective Date, the Memorandum of Understanding is terminated having no further force or effect except that the Parties agree that they shall remain committed to each other in identical form and purpose pursuant to, and as provided under, Paragraph 1 therein, which shall survive and continue to bind the Parties until such time either or both parties shall elect to terminate said commitment, which notice of said election to terminate shall cause such obligations arising under the commitment to be immediately terminated;
- Consistent with the foregoing, the Parties agree that this Release and Termination shall have no force or effect upon any now or future-existing mutual aid agreement or obligation as contemplated or allowed by statute or any other existing or successive agreement or instrument entered into by the Parties;

4. This Release and Termination may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which when executed and delivered shall constitute a duplicate original, but all counterparts together shall constitute a single Release and Termination.

Subject: Unbudgeted/Excess Revenue Appropriation

There are times when a department/office receives, or earns, or becomes eligible to receive funds, after the annual budget has been adopted. Section 65.90(5), of the *Wisconsin Statutes*, requires County Board action and approval to change/amend a budget for unbudgeted/excess revenues and expenditures.

Dodge County is a self-organized county. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 59.03(1), of the Wisconsin Statutes, Dodge County is authorized to exercise any organizational or administrative power, subject only to the Constitution, and to any enactment of the legislature which is a statewide concern, and which uniformly affects every county. There is a lack of clarity regarding delegation of the County Board's authority to change/amend an adopted budget.

Operationally, it will be more effective and efficient for day to day county operations for the County Board to delegate its authority to change/amend adopted budgets for unbudgeted/excess revenue of diminutive and miniscule amounts. Delegating authorization to appropriate unbudgeted revenues and corresponding expenditures in amounts of up to \$50,000 (which is less than 0.05% of a \$110 million budget), for each separate request submitted to the Dodge County Finance Director, will greatly increase the effectiveness and efficiency of Dodge County financial operations.

The Dodge County Finance Director has discretion to refer to the County Board for action and approval, a request for a change/amendment to a budget for unbudgeted/excess revenues and corresponding expenditures.

Any change/amendment to the budget for unbudgeted/excess revenues approved by the Dodge County Finance Director shall be reviewed with the County Administrator and reported to the Dodge County Finance Committee at the next regular meeting.

Attached as Exhibit "A" is the form I prescribe and will be used by a department head or an elected official. I may from time to time amend this form.

The requested authorization was initially presented to the Finance Committee on May 10th. Further discussion by the Finance Committee was held on June 14th, which resulted in the signing of the attached Resolution.



AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 9 — PEACE AND ORDER, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, DODGE COUNTY, WISCONSIN, TO CREATE SECTION 9.09 — REPORTING REQUIREMENTS FOR PAWN BROKERS, SECONDHAND ARTICLE DEALERS AND SECONDHAND JEWELRY DEALERS, AND TO AMEND CHAPTER 30 — CONSTRUCTION AND EFFECT OF ORDINANCES, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, DODGE COUNTY, WISCONSIN, TO AMEND SECTION 30.04(4)(b), SCHEDULE OF DEPOSITS, TO SET FORTH A DEPOSIT SCHEDULE.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 59.54(6), of the *Wisconsin Statutes*, the Dodge County Board of Supervisors may enact and enforce ordinances to preserve the public peace and good order within the County and provide a forfeiture for a violation of the ordinances; and,

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 134.71(14), of the *Wisconsin Statutes*, the Dodge County Board of Supervisors may enact and enforce an ordinance governing pawn brokers, secondhand article dealers, or secondhand jewelry dealers if that ordinance is at least as stringent as Section 134.71 of the *Wisconsin Statutes*; and,

WHEREAS, Section 30.04(1), of the Code of Ordinances, Dodge County, Wisconsin, requires a forfeiture for a conviction for a violation of any of the ordinances; and,

WHEREAS, Section 30.04(4)(b), of the Code of Ordinances, Dodge County, Wisconsin, sets forth the schedule of deposits required for various ordinance violations, including ordinances with a statutory counterpart; and,

WHEREAS, a deposit must be created for a violation of the Code of Ordinances, Dodge County, Wisconsin, for inclusion in Section 30.04(4)(b), of the Code of Ordinances, Dodge County, Wisconsin;

SO NOW, THEREFORE,

THE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF DODGE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 9.09 of the Code of Ordinances, Dodge County, Wisconsin, is hereby created to read as follows:

9.09 ADDITIONAL REPORTING REQUIREMENTS FOR PAWN BROKERS, SECONDHAND ARTICLE DEALERS, AND SECONDHAND JEWELRY DEALERS.

A. In addition to compliance with the provisions of Sections 9.134.71(8)(a) – (e), within 24 hours after purchasing or receiving a secondhand article or secondhand jewlery, a pawn broker, secondhand article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer shall upload to a website designated by the Dodge County Sheriff's Office, all of the information required by §134.71(8)(e), Wis. Stats., in the format required by the website, together with any additional information required by the website operator, if the pawn broker, secondhand

article dealer, or secondhand jewelry dealer has been given notice by the Dodge County Sheriff's Office of this requirement, such notice containing the name of the website, and internet address thereof.

- B. Failure to upload the information required by §134.71(8)(e), Wis. Stats., to the website as specified in Paragraph A shall not be a violation of this section if such failure is due to a temporary technological failure, provided that the pawn broker, secondhand article dealer or secondhand jewelry dealer has done all of the following:
 - Reported to the Dodge County Sheriff's Office, within 12 hours of the time for uploading the information as required by Paragraph A, the inability to comply with the requirements of Paragraph A, and a description of the temporary technological failure. The report required under this paragraph may be made telephonically or by hand-delivering a written report; and,
 - 2. Delivered a legible printed report containing all of the information required by §134.71(8)(e), Wis. Stats., to the Dodge County Sheriff's Office by not later than 4:30 p.m. on the day after the date on which the information was required to be uploaded as required by Paragraph A. The report required by this paragraph shall be delivered by hand-delivery, or by electronic means.

Section 2. Section 30.04(4)(b), of the Code of Ordinances, Dodge County, Wisconsin, is hereby amended as shown in the attached Schedule "A", which is hereby adopted by reference as part of this Ordinance, for violations of Chapter 9 of the Code of Ordinances, Dodge County, Wisconsin.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon enactment and publication as required by law.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with or in contradiction of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.
