


Dodge County Sheriff's Department 2012 Annual Report

Dear Reader:

Attached is the 2012 Annual Report of the Dodge County Sheriff's Department; a summation of the past year. This is my tenth and final annual report to you and I am as proud of this report as I was my first. The cover is a tribute to the Dodge County Explorers, one of our three volunteer organizations whose members serve as ambassadors of the department. The other two groups are the Dodge County Emergency Response Team and the Dodge County Sheriff's Posse. The Posse was the 2012 recipient of the Dodge County Law Enforcement Executive Association President's Award.

As much as we talk about technology and the efficiencies it provides us in law enforcement, it is not the most critical asset within the department. The most valuable commodity is the employees themselves. We are blessed to have a professional workforce that is passionate about their responsibilities. I applaud the entire force who spent much of 2012 worrying about tax increases, health insurance changes, wage study and an assortment of issues which have great impact upon them and their families. We saw no degradation of the workplace, no employee slow down and I thank the force for keeping the politics at home and out of the workplace.

Each and every division within the department experienced a great year. Traffic Patrol provided our residents and visitors safe travels and quick response to calls for service. The Criminal Investigation Division solved dozens and dozens of crimes, mostly from outside the county so our adjacent counties are very appreciative of our efforts. Our E911 Center is finally fully staffed for the first time in many years. Our detention facility has again exceeded budgeted revenues, providing record breaking numbers of federal boarders throughout the year. As a county we are the best in the state and rank 14th nationally.

We could not do what we do without the management team and our tremendous administrative assistants. We preach a team approach and it has resonated throughout the department as we all work together for the common good.

Lastly, as progressive as we have been in transforming this fledgling department into the best in the state over the past several years, our greatest initiative will take place in 2013. The County Board's recent approval to purchase our Records Management System (RMS) and our intent to offer this to all the local municipal law enforcement agencies will be the final step of the transformation journey. A goal since 2003, centralized RMS will become a reality over the 2013 – 2014 timeframe. This will transform the way law enforcement does business and revolutionalize our operations.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

2012 Patrol Division

RETIREMENTS

The Patrol Division had three long time employees retire at the end of 2011 and in 2012. Lieutenant Doug Ninmann retired from the sheriff's department on December 30, 2011 after serving more than 28 years. Captain Molly Soblewski retired on January 23, 2012 after serving for more than 28 years. Deputy Dale Kreitzman retired on June 3, 2012 after serving for more than 22 years. They are missed and the entire department wishes them well in their retirement.

PROMOTIONS

Due to retirements, several promotions occurred in the Patrol Division in 2012. Trace Frost who had been a patrol lieutenant was promoted to patrol captain in February, 2012. James Ketchem and Brian Loos who had been patrol sergeants were promoted to lieutenants in March, 2012. Deputies John Monaghan and Dale Schmidt were promoted to patrol sergeants in March, 2012. Lieutenant Patricia Ninmann who had been a deputy jail administrator joined the patrol division as a patrol lieutenant in March, 2012.

NEW DEPUTIES

Three new patrol deputies were hired in 2012.

Deputy Duane Olbinski started with the Patrol Division on June 20, 2012. Duane began working for the sheriff's department in the detention facility as a correctional officer January 24, 2005. Duane lives in Horicon with his wife Rita and children Jason & Daniel. Duane is currently assigned to the third shift working 12:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m.



Deputy John Gallenbeck started with the Patrol Division on July 2, 2012. John was born and raised in Horicon. John is currently on active duty with the Wisconsin Army National Guard serving as a 1st Lt. John's unit is deployed in Afghanistan supporting Operation Enduring Freedom. Everyone at the sheriff's department appreciates John's service and look forward to his safe return.



Deputy Sharon Bauch started with the Patrol Division on December 3, 2012. Sharon is from the Theresa area. Sharon was one of our first police Explorers and had worked part-time for the Villages of Theresa and Lomira Police Departments before joining the sheriff's department.



INTERDICTION

Over the course of 2010, a formal Interdiction Team was established and continued to be active in 2012. Dodge County Sheriff's Department members teamed up with the Wisconsin State Patrol during many of the deployments. In 2012, members of the Dodge County Sheriff's Department worked a total of 606 hours focused on detection of vehicles used in drug trafficking in Dodge County. During the interdiction, a total of 598 warnings and 263 citations for various traffic violations were issued. There were 19 drug related arrests made during the interdiction. One of the K9 units are available during each of the deployments.

K9 TEAMS

In the spring of 2011, two K9 teams were approved by the county board. During the summer of 2011, two black labrador retrievers were located that were excellent candidates for K9 training. Paige was acquired from River Velvet Retrievers from Horicon. Ziva was obtained from the Dodge County Humane Society. Deputies Chad Enright and Gilbert Fairman were chosen to be their handlers. Training began August, 2011 and consisted of over 160 hours of obedience, odor identification, scent theory, first aid, case law, tracking, dog behavior and patrol procedures. Certification of both teams by the North American Police Work Dog Association in narcotics detection and tracking occurred in early October, 2011. They began patrolling soon after.

Both K9 teams continued to be very active in 2012. Deputy Enright and his partner Paige and Deputy Fairman and his partner Ziva had 550 K9 deployments and conducted 452 vehicle sniffs in 2012. The teams also conducted 19 K9 tracks and assisted schools and local police departments with 19 school locker sniffs. The teams conducted 18 public appearances where they explained their purpose and the unique ability of their partners to find illegal drugs.

The K9 teams located over \$192,000 (approximate street value) of illegal drugs during their deployments. This consisted of marijuana, cocaine, heroin and illegally obtained prescription drugs. In May 2012, Deputy Fairman conducted a traffic stop where he and Ziva found approximately 30 pounds of high grade marijuana. This incident is still in the criminal justice system.

As you can see, both K9 teams have been very busy during their first full year of working together. We have found that both teams are very valuable to the sheriff's department and the citizens of Dodge County.



FATAL ACCIDENTS

Dodge County had 11 fatalities from traffic crashes in 2012. This is below the 5 year average. It is hard to pinpoint the reason but I believe contributing factors include increased patrol, aggressive investigation of accidents, steeper penalties and sentences, along with public education. Our Crash Investigation Team has done an outstanding job recreating crash scenes and determining causes. Members of the team include Sgt. Dennis Walston, Detective Ted Sullivan, Deputy Andy Rolfs, Sgt. John Monaghan, Deputy Robbie Weinfurter and Deputy Jaime Buelter.

HONOR GUARD

Members of the Honor Guard were very busy this year. They participated in 7 events ranging from presenting the colors at civic functions to providing casket watch at several law enforcement funerals. The Honor Guard has joined with other counties in forming the Wisconsin Honor Guard Association. Members of our honor guard are Deputy Kevin Harvancik, Deputy Scott Ziorgen, Lt. Brian Loos, Lt. Scott Smith, Communications Officer Cheryl Kotek, Detective Ted Sullivan, Corrections Officer Kevin Schultz, Sgt. Eric Krueger and Deputy Mike Willmann.

There were many changes in the patrol division in 2012. We had retirements, promotions and several newly hired deputies. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions or concerns regarding the patrol division.

DODGE COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT COURT SECURITY – 2012

In response to Chapter 59.27(3) of the Wisconsin statutes and Chapter 70.38 of the Wisconsin State Supreme Court Rules, the sheriff of Dodge County and the presiding judge has established a level of court security in the Dodge County Justice Facility. The Dodge County sheriff and the presiding judge wish to address the potential dangers to the safety of county and state employees who work in the Dodge County Justice Facility as well as that of the public who conduct business in the facility.

Court security in the justice facility is designed to increase building security in a fiscally responsible manner. The manner of security is also designed to avoid unreasonable inconvenience to both staff and the public. Court security will provide a deterrent to acts of violence in the facility by maintaining a presence of security in the facility and by attempting to keep dangerous weapons and other unauthorized items out of the facility. A secondary mission of the court security staff includes providing information, direction and other customer service needs to the public.

Part-time court security staff in 2012: Dave Beal, Kelly Cotter, Larry Huettl, Mark Jahnke and Amy Yahnke.

Court Security Activity

Other agencies continue to contact the sheriff's department regarding our policies and procedures as they relate to security matters at the justice facility. These continued requests to us for information are an indication that Dodge County continues to be the example on how to design, implement and maintain a safe environment for those who access and work in the courthouse setting.

Court security officers screened 44,240 visitors who entered the justice facility in 2012.

In 2012, there was a significant increase in confiscated weapons at the justice facility. Weapons that were confiscated were any item that had a sharp point or could be utilized as a weapon to cause harm to any person. The majority of these items were returned to the owner upon exit of the building. Court security officers are proactive and attend proceedings that are of a sensitive nature or that have the potential of being emotionally charged. Examples of the proceedings are temporary restraining order hearings. We feel this presence is a calming influence and prevents disturbances before they occur.

GENERAL INVESTIGATIONS

The Criminal Investigation Division lost an experienced and valuable asset when Detective Robert Neuman retired in 2012. Bob's skill and knowledge as an investigator will be missed. Detective Theodore Sullivan was promoted in 2012 from the patrol division and has completed his training in most aspects of investigations. Detective Sullivan transitioned into his new duties very well and has become a valuable member of the unit.

In 2012 the Criminal Investigation Division conducted 377 criminal investigations and 167 prison investigations. Dodge County experienced an increase in both property and violent crimes in 2012. Solve rate on property crimes remains consistent at 23%. Violent crimes solve rate showed a significant increase at 88%.

CURRENT TRENDS

Property crimes continue to occupy a large amount of investigative time. Property crime numbers increased in 2012 due largely to the demand for high value scrap metal. We believe that there is a clear connection between drug use and the increase of property crimes. With pawn shops, secondhand buyers and high scrap prices, stolen items are easily converted to quick cash. Property crimes can be difficult to solve due to generally very little evidence to collect and the inability to identify and verify that items belong to victims. The Criminal Investigation Division property crimes solve rate is comparable to the state average.

Violent crimes increased in 2012. The Criminal Investigation Division solve rate with violent crimes was exceptional in 2012. The division's percent of solved violent crimes was well above the state average.

New technology in the areas of electronic surveillance and the use of social media continues to be beneficial for investigators. In an increasingly high-tech world, more and more crimes involve the use of electronic devices. The Criminal Investigation Division has been provided new equipment and technology to assist them in investigating crime with a social media nexus.

The Criminal Investigation Division will continue to monitor trends in crime to be prepared and proactive in our response to investigate and solve reported crimes occuring within Dodge County.

DRUG TASK FORCE

The Dodge County Drug Task Force which consists of several Dodge County law enforcement agencies working together to share intelligence, combat drug use and educate the community continued to show a positive impact in 2012.

122 arrests 12 search warrants \$13,912 in asset forfeitures

Heroin and prescription drug abuse have become the top priority of the drug task force. In 2012 it became clear that the connection between the abuse of prescription drugs is a clear gateway to heroin use. The affects of both opiate based drugs are similar. Most abusers start with misusing prescription drugs and then shift to heroin use. Prescription drugs are readily available although the cost is high with prices up to \$80 per pill. On the other hand, heroin is roughly half the price and also readily available. The investigations of these types of cases are unique in that the drugs are generally sold and used in small quantities. Often the users will travel out of the area to larger cities and only purchase small quantities, enough for one or two days. The users may make that trip several times a week.

The task force has focused a great deal of time pursuing these types of cases and it appears with a positive impact as several arrests have resulted in a decrease in availability in these types of drugs.

Marijuana is still available in the area with some high-grade marijuana being shipped into the area from California. Cocaine powder and crack cocaine seem to be in a steep decline of availability in Dodge County.

The Dodge County Drug Task Force is committed to working with all agencies within the county and surrounding areas to continue to develop informants, arrange controlled buys and conduct search warrants in an effort to disrupt and dismantle drug trafficking and abuse within Dodge County.

OPERATIONS

<u>Combined 911 Trunks - \$7,000 annual savings:</u> In 2012 the Communications Division worked closely with our 911 provider, AT&T, to increase efficiency and reduce the cost of our 911 system. The result was a move to redirect our wireless 911 calls to lines that had been used only for wire-line (landline) 911 calls. As the amount of 911 calls being made from landline phones continues to steadily decrease, this combining of resources made sense. It is also a cost savings to the sheriff's department and Dodge County.

<u>Communication Training Program:</u> The amount and complexity of information and tasks that must be trained to recruit officers in the E911 Communications Center continues to increase. You can be proud of the job our Communications Training Officers do in preparing new hires to assume the responsibilities that come with being a professional communications officer. Our Communications Training Officers (CTOs) were not only tasked with training new staff in 2012 but also with identifying and revamping the standards and tasks of the training program. The benefits of this work were readily seen in the results while training two new communications officers. At the end of 2012, the communications center was well on its way to being fully staffed for the first time in a decade.

2012 was an example of the continued tradition of excellence for your Dodge County Sheriff's Department E911 Communications Center. The communications officers met and worked successfully through all challenges presented to them. Complex fire calls, ice rescues, severe weather events, death and stolen property investigations and serious traffic crashes are a few examples of call types they routinely worked through. Your Dodge County communications officers are truly your first-first responders to all emergencies.

STAFF

We welcomed two new communications officers and one deputy secretary in 2012. The addition of two communications officers, Tammy Lloyd and Dawn Learned, fill all division positions for the first time in a decade. The addition of Deputy Secretary Jodi Zitlow in April, added to our already capable administrative support team at the sheriff's department.

Deputy Secretary Jodi Zitlow is currently assigned to the Civil Process post at the sheriff's department. Her professional experience includes legal secretary at Dodge County Corporation Counsel and paralegal/legal secretary at Madden Law Firm, S.C. of Mayville. Jodi is a Mayville resident.

Tammy Lloyd, a Beaver Dam resident, joined our communications officer ranks in September. Tammy has many years of previous experience as a 911 telecommunicator. She most recently was employed by Sun Prairie Police Department as a dispatcher and also has professional experience from Lake Havasu, Arizona Public Safety and Beaver Dam Police Department



Sgt. David Zirbel (promoted in December) began his career at the sheriff's department in January, 2004. Prior to employment here, David was an accomplished dispatcher for the city of Beaver Dam. David is currently assigned to third shift and is a resident of Mayville.





As you take a closer look into the 2012 numbers for the detention facility on the next few pages, you will see a decline in bookings, transports, transport miles and revenues. Most of these changes are a result of housing fewer ICE detainees in 2012 as well as having fewer trips to Chicago to pick up detainees. Some of the decline in the number of transports and transport miles can also be attributed to the ability for ICE detainees to make video court appearances from this facility. No longer are detainees taken to Chicago for routine court proceedings. As a result, once a detainee arrives at the facility, their length of stay is usually longer.

PERSONNEL: The facility saw many personnel changes in 2012. Retirees from the division included Officers Clara Marx, Dale Oestreich and Joe Vukovich. Officer Duane Olbinski was hired as a patrol deputy. Four new corrections officers were hired to fill some of the existing vacancies.

Officer Kevin Schultz was promoted to corporal. Corporal Schultz has been with the division for about 12 years.

There were a number of projects at the detention facility during 2012 that had significant impacts in a number of different areas. The areas affected included safety and security, operational efficiency and a "green" project.

Kitchen Cameras: The facility had been experiencing a number of security issues in the kitchen. As a result, additional cameras were added in the kitchen in order to provide views of areas that were not previously covered. The remaining parts of the project included a multiplex monitor which was placed in the kitchen office allowing the contracted staff to observe all camera views at one time.

Kitchen Pulper: A pulper was added to the sanitation operation in the kitchen. With the addition of the pulper, we are able to reduce the amount of solids going into the city of Juneau's sewer system as well as certain levels of bio chemical oxygen demands (BODs). The city has set levels for BODs leaving the facility and if the levels exceed that amount, the city has and would continue to fine the county. This system will prevent this from occurring.

Pod Kiosks: Kiosks were installed in every section of all the housing units. Inmates are now able to order commissary items electronically. This replaces a system where the inmate would fill out a "scan sheet". Inmates would then turn the scan sheets in to the housing unit officer who would then forward the sheets to one of the deputy secretaries. The current system takes the officers and the secretary out of the process freeing their time up for other tasks. In 2013 the kiosk capabilities will be expanded to handle certain types of inmate requests.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS DRILL

Over the past several years, the Detention Facility Fire Committee has worked to expand the facility's response to a variety of emergency situations. The committee incorporates scenarios that include partial to total evacuation of the facility, housing inmates off-site, short and long term operational changes and natural to man-made disasters.

In 2012 the Fire Committee set up a drill that involved facility staff, 7 area fire departments, ladder trucks from the cities of Juneau and Horicon and the Juneau EMS. This was the first exercise of this size at the facility. The drill lasted for approximately two hours during which time facility staff

evacuated three sections of a housing unit, firefighters conducted search maneuvers as well as bringing hoses deeper into the facility than ever before. Ladder trucks were also staged outside of the facility to address scenarios involving the roof of the facility. A debriefing and critique of the drill took place at the end of the exercise.

We wish to thank and recognize the fire departments involved in the exercise: Beaver Dam, Burnett, Clyman, Horicon, Hustisford, Iron Ridge and Juneau.

Revenues for 2012 were down from the previous year but still remained high as compared to other years. Expenses for 2012 were the lowest since 2009 which allowed the facility to generate a surplus of \$323,496.

PROGRAMS

COMMUNITY WORK PROGRAM

In 2012, 98 Huber inmates worked a total of 10,830 hours at 42 different job sites. This saved the county approximately \$41,640 in housing and other related costs by a reduction in the length of inmate sentences.





In early December, 2012, work crew inmates assisted the Village of Lowell in the construction of a temporary hockey rink for use in one of the village parks. The inmates worked a total of 53 hours to lay out a rink that was 50 x 100 feet. The work crew used sand donated by a local construction company to fill approximately 775 sandbags. The sandbags were used to construct the base of the rink as well as a curb around the entire outside of the rink. The work crew inmates received a combined sentence credit time of 79.5 hours and on one of the days, they received a hot lunch compliments of the village.

NEW PROGRAM

In 2012 the detention facility was able to offer a new religious program to the inmates and detainees housed at the facility. The new program is Hispanic Catholic Bible Study with mass and confession. Volunteers from the St. Katharine Drexel Church in Beaver Dam provide a bible study, Catholic mass and confession, all in Spanish. The program is held on Friday afternoons. One week is devoted to bible study and the following week focuses on confession and mass services by a Catholic priest.

SEWING PROGRAM

The sewing program continues to produce cost savings for the county. Over a period of 6 years the sewing program has saved the county approximately \$85,725.96 in costs related to clothing and linen replacement. Huber inmates were also involved with this program earning sentence credit which also resulted in savings related to housing costs.
