CALL STATISTICS

- Recorded Contacts were down from 541 in January to 506 in February

Dodge County's Nomination For the 2017 BCSCW Community Breastfeeding Award

Carol Schwab R.D., C.L.E. deserves the Breastfeeding Advocate Award. She is the WIC Director for Dodge County and is committed to the promotion of the practice of breastfeeding. She works with prenatal and postpartum women to educate them about the benefits of breastfeeding. She advocates for the protection of the practice of breastfeeding by providing them with information and discussing any issues they may have with returning to work or school. When the women deliver their baby, Carol will call and follow-up with them and offer her support throughout their postpartum course. Because Carol has established a relationship with them, the mothers are comfortable with her coming to their home to assist them with any breastfeeding situation. The WIC Breastfeeding Composite Report consistently shows that the Dodge County WIC Program has a Breastfeeding Incidence and Duration that is 12% to 15% higher for infants from Birth to 6 months than the State of Wisconsin averages for the same time period.

Carol also works with the Dodge County Public Health Nurses, MD's and the Beaver Dam Community Hospital IBCLC Lactation Consultant to coordinate care for the breastfeeding mother and infant. When a client is a WIC participant, Carol is able to deliver a WIC breast pump to the home. She will educate the mother on the care of the pump and how to use it. Clients have given her a call when they are having problems and she always makes time for them and will go to their home to help them. On agency surveys, clients have acknowledged the help that Carol has given them at a home visit and how much they appreciated her help. She is also a very valuable resource to the Public Health Nurses to go to with questions or concerns they may have regarding their clients, who are not always WIC clients. As coworkers, we see how Carol works tirelessly as an advocate for breastfeeding, the benefits of breastfeeding and how willing she is to help anyone in need of her expertise. The Dodge County WIC Staff and the Dodge County Public Health Staff are all in agreement that Carol deserves this award.

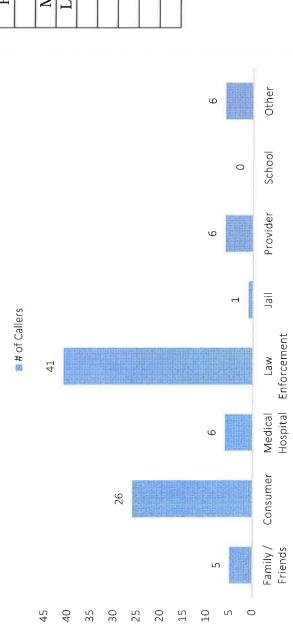
