Dodge County Board of Supervisors April 17, 2018 – 9:00 a.m. Administration Building - Juneau, Wisconsin

The Organizational Session of the Dodge County Board of Supervisors was called to order by Chairman Russell Kottke at 9:00 a.m.

The Board rose to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken by the Clerk with all Supervisors being in attendance with the exception of Supervisor Roesch who had previously asked to be excused. Supervisor Wurtz left the meeting at 10:22 a.m.

Supervisors were sworn in by Karen J. Gibson, County Clerk, and the Clerk read the Statement of Election. Chairman Kottke introduced and welcomed the new members to the Board: Kevin Burnett, William Hoekstra, Timothy Kemmel, Dale Macheel, Jeffrey Schmitt and Eugene Wurtz.

Chairman Kottke called for approval of the minutes. A motion was made by Supervisor Miller and seconded by Supervisor D. Schmidt to approve the minutes of the March 20, 2018, session of the County Board meeting as recorded, and dispense with the reading of the minutes. The motion passed by acclamation with no negative votes cast, and was so ordered by the Chairman.

Communications on File

Karen J. Gibson, County Clerk, reported there were no communications on file.

Special Orders of Business

Election

Chairman Kottke called for nominations for Chairman. Supervisor Miller nominated Supervisor Maly. Supervisor Nickel nominated Supervisor Kottke. Supervisor J. Schmitt nominated Supervisor Frohling. Supervisor Frohling declined the nomination. Chairman Kottke closed nominations and chose Supervisors Glewen, Justmann and Benter as ballot clerks. After the ballots were cast, the ballot clerks retired to tally the votes. The votes were cast as follows: Supervisor Maly - 8 and Supervisor Kottke - 24, thereby re-electing Supervisor Kottke as Chairman. Chairman Kottke thanked the Board for their support.

Chairman Kottke opened the nominations for 1st Vice Chairman. Supervisor Schaefer nominated Supervisor Frohling. Supervisor Hilbert nominated Supervisor Maly. Supervisor J. Schmitt nominated Supervisor Marsik. Supervisor Houchin nominated Supervisor Berres. Supervisor Marsik declined the nomination. Chairman Kottke closed nominations and chose the same ballot clerks. After the ballots were cast, the ballot clerks retired to tally the votes. The votes were cast as follows: Supervisor Frohling – 16, Supervisor Maly – 9 and Supervisor Berres – 7. None of the candidates received a majority of the votes and another vote needed to be cast. After the ballots were cast, the ballot clerks retired to tally the votes. The votes were cast as follows: Supervisor Frohling – 19, Supervisor Maly – 8 and Supervisor Berres - 5, thereby electing Supervisor Frohling as 1st Vice Chairman.

Chairman Kottke then opened nominations for 2^{nd} Vice Chairman. Supervisor D. Schmidt nominated Supervisor Marsik. Supervisor Sheahan-Malloy nominated Supervisor Berres. Supervisor Miller nominated Supervisor Maly. Supervisor J. Schmitt nominated Supervisor D. Schmidt. Supervisor D. Schmidt declined the nomination. Chairman Kottke closed nominations and chose the same ballot clerks. After the ballots were cast, the ballot clerks retired to tally the votes. The votes were cast as follows: Supervisor Marsik -16, Supervisor Berres -6 and Supervisor Maly -10. None of the

candidates received a majority of the votes and another vote needed to be cast. After the ballots were cast, the ballot clerks retired to tally the votes. The votes were cast as follows: Supervisor Marsik -17, Supervisor Berres -5 and Supervisor Maly 10, thereby electing Supervisor Marsik as 2^{nd} Vice Chairman.

Chairman Kottke then opened nominations for Four Members – At-Large to the Executive Committee. Supervisor Frohling nominated Supervisor D. Schmidt. Supervisor D. Schmidt nominated Supervisor Berres. Supervisor Houchin nominated Supervisor Sheahan-Malloy. Supervisor D. Schmidt nominated Supervisor Nickel. Supervisor Bobholz nominated Supervisor Maly. Supervisor Maly nominated Supervisor Miller. Supervisor Houchin nominated Supervisor J. Schmitt. Chairman Kottke closed nominations and chose the same ballot clerks. After the ballots were cast, the ballot clerks retired to tally the votes. At this time, the County Clerk informed the board members that she had put a voluntary demographics survey from the Wisconsin Counties Association on each of their desks. Question by Supervisor Berres regarding the survey answered by the County Clerk. The County Clerk was advised by the tally clerks that there was one ballot cast that was not signed on the back therefore reducing the number of ballots cast to 31 and the number of votes needed for a majority to 16. The votes were cast as follows: Supervisor D. Schmidt - 19, Supervisor Berres - 23, Supervisor Sheahan-Malloy - 16, Supervisor Nickel - 15, Supervisor Maly - 17, Supervisor Miller - 12 and Supervisor J. Schmitt - 11, thereby electing Supervisors D. Schmidt, Berres, Sheahan-Malloy and Maly to the Executive Committee.

Chairman Kottke called upon the Board to take formal action to select Annette Thompson, Dodgeland School District Superintendent, as a member of the UW-Extension Education Committee. A motion to select Annette Thompson as a member of the UW-Extension Education Committee was made by Supervisor Caine and seconded by Supervisor Behl. The motion passed by acclamation with no negative votes cast, thereby approving the appointment.

Chairman Kottke called upon Supervisor Miller, Chairman, Judicial and Public Protection Committee who called on Sheriff Dale Schmidt who gave a presentation on the 2017 Sheriff's Office Annual Report.

The Chairman called for a 10 minute recess at 10:22 a.m.

The Board reconvened at 10:33 a.m., by order of the Chair. Chairman Kottke called for the following Resolutions and Reports to be read by the Clerk and acted upon by the Board:

Take formal action to adopt the County Board Rules as established by Resolution 17-102. A motion was made by Supervisor Frohling and seconded by Supervisor D. Schmidt. The motion passed by acclamation with no negative votes cast, thereby approving the County Board Rules as established in Resolution 17-102.

Resolution No. 18-01 Resolution Amending Rule 29 of the Rules of Order Governing the County Board of Supervisors of Dodge County, WI – Executive Committee. A motion for adoption was made by Supervisor Berres and seconded by Supervisor Bobholz. Supervisor Miller made a motion to lay this Resolution over until the June County Board meeting. Questions by Supervisors Houchin and Maly answered by Supervisor Miller and Corporation Counsel Kimberly Nass. Comments by Supervisors Berres, J. Schmitt, Nickel, Maly and Frohling. The vote was cast with 12 ayes and 19 noes, thereby defeating the motion to layover the Resolution.

Due to technical difficulties with the voting system, a voice vote was called on Resolution 18-01 as amended with all voting in the affirmative, thereby adopting the Resolution as amended.

Resolution No. 18-02 Recognizing Grant Award to Address Opioid Misuse – Human Services and Health Board. A motion for adoption was made by Supervisor Justmann and seconded by Supervisor Bobholz. The vote was cast with all voting in the affirmative, thereby adopting the Resolution.

Recognizing May 7, 2018 through May 12, 2018 as "National Economic Development Week" – Executive Committee. A motion for adoption was made by Supervisor Frohling and seconded by Supervisor D. Schmidt. The vote was cast with all voting in the affirmative, thereby adopting the Resolution.

A motion for adoption was made by Supervisor Muche and seconded by Supervisor Behl. The vote was cast with all voting in the affirmative, thereby adopting the Report and Ordinance.

Report No. 2 County Official's Bonds – Executive Committee. The Chairman ordered this to be placed on file.

The Chairman ordered these be placed on file.

Chairman Kottke reminded the Board to turn in their committee questionnaire to him by Friday, April 20, 2018. He informed the Board that the Finance Committee meeting scheduled for 12:30 p.m. today would be held in Rooms F&G on the 1st Floor. He also informed the Board that the Watertown Daily Times would like to get pictures of the Executive Committee and the new County Board members after the meeting.

At 11:15 a.m. Supervisor Frohling made a motion to recess until Wednesday, May 16, 2018 at 7:00 p.m. Supervisor Maly seconded the motion. The motion passed by acclamation, with no negative votes cast, and was so ordered by the Chairman.

Section 1. The "official zoning map" adopted with the Land Use Code, Dodge County, Wisconsin on March 21, 2000 is hereby amended as shown on the map attached hereto and made part of this ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be effective upon passage.



1.5 GENERAL PROVISIONS

(1) AREAS TO BE REGULATED

This ordinance regulates all lands within the boundaries of Dodge County, lying outside the limits of incorporated cities and villages that would be covered by the regional flood or base flood as shown on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) or other maps approved by the DNR. **Note:** Base flood elevations are derived from the flood profiles in the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and are shown as AE, A1-30, and AH Zones on the FIRM. Other regulatory zones are displayed as A and AO zones. Regional Flood Elevations (RFE) may be derived from other studies. If more than one map or revision is referenced, the most restrictive information shall apply.

- (a) EXEMPTION (2017 Wisconsin Act 115 87.30 (1m) (ag) (intro.)

 Notwithstanding any other provision of law or administrative rule promulgated thereunder, the Floodplain Zoning Ordinance does not apply to lands adjacent to farm drainage ditches if all of the following apply:
 - 1. Such lands are not within the floodplain of a natural navigable stream or river;
 - Those parts of the drainage ditches adjacent to these lands were non-navigable streams before ditching.
- (b) EXEMPTION (2017 Wisconsin Act 115 87.30(1m) (am) Wis. Stats.)

 Notwithstanding any other provision of law or administrative rule promulgated thereunder, the provisions of the Floodplain Zoning Ordinance do not apply to lands adjacent to farm drainage ditches if all of the following apply, except to the extent necessary for the municipality to which the floodplain zoning ordinance applies to maintain eligibility for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program:
 - 1. The farm drainage ditch is subject to the jurisdiction of a drainage district under Ch. 88 Wis. Stats.
 - 2. The disposal of material in a floodplain is within the drainage district corridor under 88.74 Wis. Stats.
 - 3. The lands adjacent to the corridor are maintained in nonstructural agricultural use or other nonstructural use.

(2017 Wisconsin Act 68) An existing structure that was lawfully placed when constructed but that does not comply with the required shoreland setback, or that is legally located in the shoreland setback area by operation of a variance granted before July 13, 2015, may be maintained, repaired, replaced, restored, rebuilt, or remodeled without a County Shoreland Land Use Permit if the activity does not expand the footprint of the nonconforming structure. Further, an existing structure that was lawfully placed when constructed but that does not comply with the required shoreland setback may be vertically expanded unless the vertical expansion would extend more than 35 feet above grade level. Counties shall (2015 ACT 167) allow expansion of a structure beyond the existing footprint if the expansion is necessary to comply with applicable state for federal requirements.

Note: Section 59.692(1k)(a)2, 4 and (b) stats. prohibits counties from requiring any approval or imposing any fee or mitigation requirements for the <u>activities</u> activates specified in Section 11.2. However, it is important to note that property owners may be required to obtain permits or approvals and counties may impose fees under ordinances adopted pursuant to other statutory requirements, such as floodplain zoning, general zoning, sanitary codes, building codes or even stormwater erosion control.

Note: NR 115.05(1)(b)1m and Section 6.1(1) lists structures that are exempt from the shoreland setback. These structures are considered conforming structures and are not considered nonconforming structures. Structures that were granted variances or illegally constructed structures are not considered nonconforming structures.

2. Modify Section 14.1(3)(c)2 as follows:

(c) Powers and Duties

The powers and duties of the Dodge County Board of Adjustment under this Ordinance shall be as follows:

1. Interpretations

The Board of Adjustment shall be responsible for interpreting the regulations and boundaries of the districts, upon referral by the Land Use Administrator.

2. Variances

The Board of Adjustment shall be responsible for hearing and authorizing variances from the terms of the ordinance that will not be contrary to the public interest, where, owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance will result in unnecessary hardship, and so that the spirit of the ordinance shall be observed and substantial justice done. hearing and granting variances where, owing to special conditions, a literal enforcement of this Ordinance would result in practical difficulty or unnecessary hardship.

3. Modify Section 14.1 (b) as follows:

b) Review and Decision Procedure

The Land Use Administrator shall review each permit application and approve, withhold, or deny within 30 days based on the Approval Criteria of Section 14.2(1) (c) 13.6 (1)(c). Any permit issued in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be null and void.

4. Modify Section 14.1(2) through 14.1(2)(f) as follows:

(2) Conditional Use Permits

In this subsection:

"Conditional use" means a use allowed under a conditional use permit, special exception or other special zoning permission issued by a county, but does not include a variance.

"Substantial Evidence" means facts and information, other than merely personal preferences or speculation, directly pertaining to the requirements and conditions an applicant must meet to obtain a conditional use permit and that reasonable persons would accept in support of a conclusion.

The Committee shall authorize the Land Use Administrator to issue a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for conditional uses after review and a public hearing, provided that such conditional uses are in accordance with the purpose and intent of this Ordinance and the approval criteria provided in Section 14.2(2)(c) 13.22(3), and are found not to be hazardous, harmful, offensive, or otherwise adverse to the environment or the value of the area.

(a) Procedure

Applications for CUP's shall be made to the Land Use Administrator, <u>upon forms provided by the Department</u>, who shall forward them upon receipt to the Committee. <u>The applicant must demonstrate that the application and all requirements established by the Department relating to the conditional use permit request are or will be satisfied and are supported by substantial <u>evidence</u>. Such applications shall include the following where applicable:</u>

- The names and addresses of the applicant, owner of the site, architect, professional engineer, contractor, and all property owners of record within 300 feet of the subject property boundary;
- 2. A description of the subject site by parcel identification number (PIN), lot, block, and recorded subdivision or by metes and bounds; address of the subject site; type of structure;
- A scaled drawing showing dimensions of the lot and locations of all existing and proposed structures and impervious surfaces relative to the lot lines, center line of abutting highways and the ordinary highwater mark of any abutting water course; and the location of any existing or proposed on-site sewage systems and any private or public water supply systems;
- 4. A scaled site plan with specifications for the proposed filling, grading, lagooning or dredging project being proposed including but not limited to the area to be disturbed, the extent of the proposed project, a cross section showing the depth and width of the filling project and showing the cross section of all culverts or bridges if applicable;
- 5. Erosion Control plans;
- 6. Plans for appropriate mitigation when required:
- 7. The appropriate application fee:
- 8. A detailed narrative of the proposed project;
- Additional information as may be required by the Committee or the Land Use Administrator.

(b) Public hearings

Public hearings on complete applications shall be scheduled within 30 days and shall receive notice in accordance with the applicable Wisconsin State Statutes and pursuant to the

general notice provisions of Section 14.5(5) 13.55. In addition, the Land Use Administrator shall notify the Department of Natural Resources at least 10 prior to any public hearing, as required under NR115(4)(h) and all property owners within 300 feet of the subject property boundary as listed by the applicant in the original application of the time, date and subject matter of the hearing. Failure to comply with this provision shall not, however, invalidate any previous or subsequent action on the application.

(c) General Approval Criteria for Conditional Use Permits

Conditional Use Permits shall be approved by the Committee if they find that all of the following criteria have been met <u>and the applicant agrees to meet the conditions specified in the Code, and those imposed by the Committee:</u>

- 1. The proposed use complies with all applicable provisions of this Ordinance;
- 2. Adequate assurances of continuing maintenance of safe and healthful conditions have been provided;
- 3. The project has been designed to prevent and control water pollution and sedimentation;
- 4. The project is in compliance with local floodplain zoning ordinance and the potential for damage to adjacent properties due to altered surface water drainage has been mitigated to the maximum extent possible, and to the satisfaction of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources;
- 5. The erosion potential of the site based upon degree and direction of slope, soil type and vegetative cover has been considered and any significant adverse impacts will be mitigated to the maximum practical extent;
- Public safety, transportation and utility facilities and services will be available to serve the subject property while maintaining sufficient levels of service for existing development;
- 7. The need of the proposed use for a shoreland location has been considered and the proposed use will not cause substantial diminution in value of other property in the neighborhood in which it is to be located;
- The proposed use is compatible with uses on adjacent land and the use will not be significantly detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare unless the use is a public necessity;
- The amount of liquid and solid wastes to be generated and the adequacy of the proposed disposal systems has been considered and any potential significant adverse impacts on the natural environment will be mitigated to the maximum practical extent;
- 10. The following general criteria has been considered:
 - (i) Domestic uses shall be generally preferred;
 - (ii) Uses not inherently a source of pollution within an area shall be preferred over uses that are or may be a pollution source;
 - (iii) Use locations within an area tending to minimize the possibility of pollution shall be preferred over use locations tending to increase that possibility. Additional standards such as parking, noise, may be referred to the applicable part of their ordinance.

(d) Conditions

The Committee may attach such conditions, in addition to those required elsewhere in this Ordinance, that it deems necessary in furthering the purpose of this Ordinance. Any condition imposed by the Committee must be related to the purpose of the Ordinance and be based on substantial evidence. The requirements and conditions must be reasonable and, to the extent practicable, measurable. Violation of any of these conditions shall be deemed a violation of this Ordinance. In granting a conditional use permit, the Committee may not impose conditions which are more restrictive than any of the specific standards in the ordinance. Where the ordinance is silent as to the extent of restriction, the Committee may

impose any reasonable permit conditions to affect the purpose of this ordinance. Such conditions may include specifications for:

- 1. Type of shore cover;
- 2. Specific sewage disposal and water supply facilities;
- 3. Landscaping and planting screens;
- 4. Hours of operation;
- 5. Operational control:
- 6. Sureties;
- 7. Deed restrictions,
- 8. Locations of piers, docks, parking and signs; or
- 9. Type of construction or any other requirement necessary to fulfill the purpose and intent of this Ordinance.
- 10. Additional Information

In evaluating each application, the Committee may request assistance from other local, county, state or federal agencies. Also, in order to secure information upon which to base its determination, the Committee may require the applicant to furnish, in addition to the information required for a Conditional Use Permit, the following information:

- (i) A plan of the area showing contours, soil types, highwater mark, groundwater conditions, bedrock, slope and vegetative covers;
- (ii) Location of buildings, parking areas, traffic access, driveways, walkways, open space, landscaping, signs, and lighting;
- (iii) Plans for buildings, sewage disposal facilities, water supply systems, and arrangement of operations;
- (iv) Other pertinent information necessary to determine if the proposed use meets the requirements of this Ordinance.
- 11. The permits duration, transfer or renewal requirements;
- 12. Any other requirement necessary to fulfill the purpose and intent of this Ordinance.

(e) Expiration of Conditional Use Permits

Once granted, a conditional use permit shall remain in effect as long as the conditions upon which the permit was issued are followed, however, the County may impose conditions such as the permit's duration, transfer or renewal, in addition to any other conditions specified in the Code.

The decision of the Committee to approve or conditionally approve a Conditional Use Permit request shall expire one year after the decision is filed with the Department after its effective date or at such alternative time specified in the approval unless at least one of the following criteria has been met:

- 1. Construction has been diligently pursued;
- 2. A Certificate of Zoning Compliance has been issued;
- 3. The use is established:
- The Conditional Use Permit is renewed, for a period not to exceed one year;
- 5. A Conditional Use Permit also shall expire upon termination of a project or if the rights granted by the permit are discontinued for 180 consecutive days.

- 5. Create Section 14.2(4) through 14.2(6) as follows:
 - (4) USE OF EXISTING REQUIREMENTS (s. 66.10015(2)(a) Wis. Stats.) Except as provided under 14.2(5), if a person has submitted an application for an approval, the Committee shall approve, deny or conditionally approve the application solely based on existing requirements, unless the applicant and the Committee agree otherwise. An application is filed under this subsection on the date that the Department receives the application.
 - (5) MULTIPLE APPROVALS (s. 66.10015(2)(b) Wis. Stats.) If a project requires more than one approval or approvals from one or more political subdivisions and the applicant identifies the full scope of the project at the time of filing the application for the first approval required for the project, the existing requirements applicable in each political subdivision at the time of filing the application for the first approval required for the project shall be applicable to all subsequent approvals required for the project unless the applicant and the political subdivision agree otherwise.
 - (6) Development Regulations (66.10015(2)(b) Wis. Stats.) The treatment of subsections 14.2(4) and 14.2(5) of the statutes first applies to an application for an approval that is filed on or after November 28, 2017.
- **6.** Modify Section 14.5 (2) and 14.5(5)(e) as follows:

14.5 (2) Application Completeness

An application will be considered complete if it is submitted in the required number and form, includes all mandatory information, and is accompanied by the applicable fee. The Land Use Administrator shall make a determination of application completeness within 10 days of application filing. If an application is determined to be incomplete, the Land Use Administrator shall notify the applicant of the application's deficiencies. No further processing of the application shall occur until the deficiencies are corrected. If the deficiencies are not corrected by the applicant within 60 30 days of receiving notice of the deficiencies, the application shall be considered withdrawn.

14.5(5)(e) Timing of Notices

Unless otherwise expressly provided in state statutes or this Ordinance, notice, when required, shall be mailed or published at least 8 days prior to the hearing or action for changes or amendments to the Ordinance, rezonings, conditional use permit or appeals to the Board of Adjustment in accordance with Class II notice requirements. For all other actions requiring notice, notice shall be mailed or published at least 7 days prior to the hearing or action in accordance with Class I notice requirements.

7. Modify Section 14.7 as follows:

14.7 VARIANCES

In this subsection, an "Area Variance" means a modification to a dimensional, physical, or locational requirements such as the setback, frontage, height, bulk, or density restriction for a structure that is granted by the Board of Adjustment under this subsection.

(s. 59.694(7), Wis. Stats. The Board of Adjustment may grant upon appeal a variance from the standards of this ordinance in according with the following provisions:

(6) Approval Criteria

The Board of Adjustment may grant upon appeal a variance from the standards of this ordinance where an applicant convincingly demonstrates that:

- 1) Literal enforcement of the provisions of the ordinance will result in unnecessary hardship on the applicant.
 - a. Unnecessary hardship for an "Area Variance" is when strict compliance with the provisions of this Code would unreasonably prevent the property owner from using the property owner's property for a permitted purpose or would render conformity with the Code unnecessarily burdensome.
- 2) The hardship is due to special conditions that are unique to the property, and
- 3) The variance is not contrary to the public interest.

(7) Burden of Proof

In all circumstances, a property owner bears the burden of proving that the "unnecessary hardship" as it is used in subsections 14.7(6) is present and is based on conditions that are unique to the property, rather than considerations personal to the property owner and that the unnecessary hardship was not created by the property owner.

(87) Conditions

In granting a variance, the board may not impose conditions which are more restrictive than any of the specific standards in the ordinance. Where the ordinance is silent as to the extent of restriction, the board may impose any reasonable permit conditions to affect the purpose of this ordinance.

(9) Expiration of Approval

Any decision or order issued by the Board of Adjustment requiring the Land Use Administrator to issue a permit shall expire one year after the decision is filed with the Department or at such alternative time specified in the approval process unless:

- (a) The applicant or appellant has filed a land use permit application with the Department for the applicable project within such time, provided, that the time may be extended when so specified by the Board of Adjustment.
- (b) Construction has been diligently pursued;
- (c) The land use permit is renewed, for a period not to exceed one year; or
- (d) A Certificate of Zoning Compliance has been issued;
- (10) A variance granted under this subsection runs with the land.
- 8. Modify Section 14.8 as follows:

14.8 APPEALS

Appeals from the decision of any review and decision-making body may be made by any person aggrieved or their agent, or by an officer, department, board, or bureau of the County, or by any affected town board.

(8) Appeals of a Conditional Use Permit Decision by the Land Resources and Parks Committee (2017 Wisconsin Act 67) - If the Committee denies a person's conditional use permit application, the person may appeal the decision to the circuit court under the procedures contained in s. 59.694(10) Wis. Stats.

- **9.** Renumber Section 15.0 (1) as follows: 15.1(4) Violations
- 10. Create Section 15.4 (4) as follows:

(4) ENFORCEMENT OF VIOLATIONS IN PLACE FOR MORE THAN TEN YEARS (s. 59.692(1t) Wis. Stats.)

A county may not commence an enforcement action against a person who owns a building or structure that is in violation of a shoreland zoning standard or an ordinance enacted under s. 59.692 Wis. Stats. if the building or structure has been in place for more than 10 years.

11. Add the following definitions to Section 16.0 as follows:

Existing Requirements - Regulations, ordinances, rules, or other properly adopted requirements of a political subdivision that are in effect at the time the application for an approval is submitted to the political subdivision.

Political Subdivision - Political Subdivision means a city, village, town or county.

Project - Project means a specific and identifiable land development that occurs on defined and adjacent parcels of land, which includes lands separated by roads, waterways and easements.

<u>Substandard lot</u> - Substandard lot means a legally created lot or parcel that met any applicable lot size requirements when it was created, but does not meet current lot size requirements.

PETITION TO AMEND THE LAND USE CODE OF DODGE COUNTY, WISCONSIN

We, the Dodge County Planning, Development and Parks Committee, petition to amend the Land Use Code, Dodge County Wisconsin as shown in "Exhibit A"

The petition includes amendments related to limiting the authority of the County to regulate development on substandard lots and requiring the merging of lots; requiring the issuance of a conditional use permit under certain circumstances; clarifying the standards for granting certain variances, clarifying the provisions for when a land use permit is not required, and clarifying the requirements related to the repair, rebuilding, and maintenance of certain nonconforming structures. These amendments are necessary in order to bring the code into compliance with the recently amended Wisconsin State Statutes (2017 Acts 67 & 68).

The petition also includes changes to the Certified Survey Map and Plat submission provisions of the Code and a series of miscellaneous housekeeping amendments to the Code that are necessary in order to clarify certain definitions used in the Code, to clarify the height exceptions that are allowed for accessory structures, to clarify the filling, grading, dredging, ditching, tiling and excavation regulations allowed under the Code, to clarify the provisions relating to the accommodations that are allowed for the disabled, to remove the Administrative Adjustment provisions of the Code, to clarify certain uses that are allowed in the Code and to correct an error in the list of urbanized roads listed in Appendix 1 of the Code.

2.1.4.B.2 Administrative Adjustments

The Land Use Administrator shall be responsible for reviewing applications for Administrative Adjustments and acting to approve, approve with conditions, or disapprove such applications. (See Section 2.3.2)

2.2.2 Application Completeness

An application will be considered complete if it is submitted in the required number and form, includes all mandatory information, and is accompanied by the applicable fee. The Land Use Administrator shall make a determination of application completeness within 10 days of application filing. If an

application is determined to be incomplete, the Land Use Administrator shall notify the applicant of the application's deficiencies. No further processing of the application shall occur until the deficiencies are corrected. If the deficiencies are not corrected by the applicant within 30 days of receiving notice of the deficiencies, the application shall be considered withdrawn.

- 6. Modify Section 2.2.6.E as follows:

2.2.6.E Timing of Notices

Unless otherwise expressly provided in state statutes or this Code, notice, when required, shall be mailed or published at least 8 days prior to the hearing or action for changes or amendments to the Code, rezonings, conditional use permits, or appeals to the Board of Adjustment in accordance with Class II notice requirements. For all other actions requiring notice, notice shall be mailed or published at least 7 days prior to the hearing or action in accordance with Class I notice requirements.

7. Modify Section 2.2.11 as follows:

2.2.11 Findings of Fact

Final decisions of all review and decision-making bodies shall be accompanied by written findings of fact based upon the applicable standards and criteria. The findings shall be filed with the Planning and Development Department. In the event of denial, the written findings shall specify the provisions of the County's adopted regulations that the proposal failed to satisfy.

2.3.2 Administrative Adjustments

2.3.2.A Applicability

This section sets out the required review and approval procedures for Administrative Adjustments, which are modifications of 10 percent or less of any numeric Dimensional Standard set out in Chapter 5, except those related to water setbacks, residential density, or nonresidential intensity.

2.3.2.B Application Filing

Applications for Administrative Adjustments shall be submitted to the Land Use Administrator.

2.3.2.C Review and Action

The Land Use Administrator shall review each application for an Administrative Adjustment and act to approve, approve with conditions, or deny the application based on the Approval Criteria of Section 2.3.2(D).

2.3.2.D Approval Criteria

Administrative Adjustments may be approved by the Land Use Administrator only upon a finding that: (1) the modification is necessary to satisfy the federal requirements for reasonable accommodation of housing for protected groups under the federal Fair Housing Amendments Act or Americans with Disabilities Act; or (2) all of the following criteria have been met:

- **2.3.2.D.1** The requested adjustment is consistent with the Dodge County Comprehensive Plan and the stated purposes of this Code;
- **2.3.2.D.2** The requested adjustment eliminates an unnecessary inconvenience to the applicant and will have no significant adverse impact on the health, safety or general welfare of surrounding property owners or the general public;
- 2.3.2.D.3 Any adverse impacts resulting from the Administrative Adjustment will be mitigated to the maximum extent practical; and
- 2.3.2.D.4 The requested Administrative Adjustment relates to a measurable standard and is required to compensate for some unusual aspect of the site or the proposed development that is not shared by landowners in general.

2.3.2.E Hearings

No public hearing is required for an Administrative Adjustment. However, the Land Use Administrator may refer the application to the Board of Adjustment, who may schedule a public hearing on an Administrative Adjustment if they consider the application to be controversial, or believe granting the Administrative Adjustment would have an adverse impact upon surrounding property owners or the County as a whole. Additionally, the Land Use Administrator shall schedule a public hearing on the Administrative Adjustment application if requested to do so by the applicant. In such cases, written and published notice shall be provided for the public hearing pursuant to the general notice provisions of Section 2.2.6. The Board of Adjustment shall base its decision upon input received at the public hearing and upon the Approval Criteria of Section 2.3.2(D).

11. Modify Section 2.3.6 through 2.3.6.J as follows:

2.3.6 Conditional Use Permits

In this subsection:

"Conditional use" means a use allowed under a conditional use permit, special exception or other special zoning permission issued by a county, but does not include a variance.

"Substantial Evidence" means facts and information, other than merely personal preferences or speculation, directly pertaining to the requirements and conditions an applicant must meet to obtain a conditional use permit and that reasonable persons would accept in support of a conclusion.

The Committee shall authorize the Land Use Administrator to issue a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for conditional uses after review and a public hearing, provided that such conditional uses are found to be in accordance with the purpose and intent of this Code and the approval criteria provided in Section 2.3.6.F.

2.3.6.A Procedure

All Conditional Use Permit applications shall be submitted to the Land Use Administrator upon forms provided by the Department. The applicant must demonstrate that the application and all requirements established by the County relating to the conditional use permit request are or will be satisfied and are supported by substantial evidence. Applications for a conditional use permit shall include the following:

2.3.6.D Committee Review and Decision

- 2.3.6.D.1 The Committee shall hold a public hearing on the application and following the public hearing shall approve, approve with conditions or deny the conditional use permit application within 15 days after the public hearing based on the general approval criteria listed in 2.3.6.F unless the time is extended by written agreement with the applicant. Failure of the Committee to take final action within 15 days after the public hearing or within the time as extended by agreement with the applicant shall constitute an approval of the conditional use permit as proposed.
- 2.3.6.D.2 If an applicant for a conditional use permit meets or agrees to meet all of the requirements and conditions specified in this Code or those imposed by the Committee, the Committee shall grant the conditional use permit.
- **2.3.6.D.3** The requirements and conditions must be reasonable and, to the extent practicable, measurable and may include conditions such as the permit's duration, transfer or renewal.
- **2.3.6.D.4** The applicant must demonstrate that the application and all requirements of the Code relating to the conditional use are or shall be satisfied, both of which must be supported by substantial evidence.
- **2.3.6.D.5** The Committee decision to approve or deny the permit application must be supported by substantial evidence.
- **2.3.6.E** Compliance with all other provisions of this Code, such as lot width and area, yards, height, parking, loading, traffic, highway access, and the performance standards, shall be required of all conditional uses, except as modified by this Section 2.3.6.

2.3.6.F General Approval Criteria for Conditional Use Permits

Conditional Use Permits shall be approved by the Committee if they find that all of the following criteria have been met and the <u>applicant agrees to meet the conditions specified in the Code, and those imposed by the Committee:</u>

- 2.3.6. F.1 The proposed use complies with all applicable provisions of this Code:
- **2.3.6. F.2** The proposed use is compatible with adjacent uses in terms of scale, site design, operating characteristics (hours of operation, traffic generation, lighting, noise, odor, dust, and other external impacts);
- **2.3.6. F.3** The proposed use will not be significantly detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare unless the use is a public necessity;
- **2.3.6. F.4** The proposed use will not cause <u>a substantial diminution decrease</u> in value of other property in the neighborhood in which it is to be located;
- **2.3.6.F.5** Public safety, transportation and utility facilities and services will be available to serve the subject property while maintaining sufficient levels of service for existing development;
- 2.3.6.F.6 Adequate assurances of continuing maintenance have been provided:
- **2.3.6.F.7** Any significant adverse impacts on the natural environment will be mitigated to the maximum practical extent;
- **2.3.6.F.8** The proposed use will not be located in any hazard areas, including floodplains, floodways, etc., unless any potential danger is mitigated to the maximum extent possible, and to the satisfaction of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

2.3.6.G Conditions

The Committee may attach such conditions, in addition to those required elsewhere in this Code, that it deems necessary in furthering the purpose of this Code. Any condition imposed by the Committee must be related to the purpose of the Code and be based on substantial evidence. The requirements and conditions must be reasonable and, to the extent practicable, measurable. Violation of any of these conditions shall be deemed a violation of this Code.

- **2.3.6.G.1** Type of shore cover:
- 2.3.6.G.2 Increased setback and yards;
- 2.3.6.G.3 Specified sewage disposal and water supply facilities:
- 2.3.6.G.4 Landscaping and planting screens;
- 2.3.6.G.5 Hours of operation;
- 2.3.6.G.6 Operational control;
- **2.3.6.G.7** Sureties;
- 2.3.6.G.8 Deed restrictions,
- 2.3.6.G.9 Locations of piers, docks, parking and signs; or
- 2.3.6.G.10 The permit's duration, transfer or renewal requirements:
- 2.3.6.G.11 Type of construction; or
- 2.3.6.G.12 Any other requirement necessary to fulfill the purpose and intent of this Code.

2.3.6.H Additional Information

In evaluating each application, the Committee may request assistance from other local, county, state or federal agencies. Also, in order to secure information upon which to base its determination, the Committee may require the applicant to furnish, in addition to the information required for a Conditional Use Permit, the following information:

- **2.3.6.H.1** A plan of the area showing contours, soil types, highwater mark, groundwater conditions, bedrock, slope and vegetative covers.
- **2.3.6.H.2** Location of buildings, parking areas, traffic access, driveways, walkways, open space, landscaping, signs, and lighting;
- **2.3.6.H.3** Plans for buildings, sewage disposal facilities, water supply systems, and arrangement of operations;
- **2.3.6.H.4** Other pertinent information necessary to determine if the proposed use meets the requirements of this Code.

2.3.6.1 Expiration of Conditional Use Permits

Once granted, a conditional use permit shall remain in effect as long as the conditions upon which the permit was issued are followed, however, the County may impose conditions such as the permit's duration, transfer or renewal, in addition to any other conditions specified in the Code.

- **2.3.6.I.1** The decision of the Committee to approve or conditionally approve a Conditional Use Permit request shall expire one year after its effective date after the decision is filed with the Department or at such alternative time specified in the approval unless:
- 2.3.6.I.1.a Construction has been diligently pursued;
- 2.3.6.I.1.b A Certificate of Zoning Compliance has been issued;
- 2.3.6.I.1.c. The use is established: or
- 2.3.6.1.1.d The Conditional Use Permit is renewed, for a period not to exceed one year.
- **2.3.6.I.2** A Conditional Use Permit also shall expire upon termination of a project or if the rights granted by the permit are discontinued for 180 consecutive days.

2.3.6.J Appeals

If the Committee denies a person's conditional use permit application, the person may appeal the decision to the circuit court under the procedures contained in s. 59.694(10) Wis. Stats.

12. Modify Section 2.3.9.F.2.b.vii through 2.3.9.F.2.d as follows:

2.3.9.F.2.b Additional Information

The map shall show correctly on its face, in addition to the information required by Section 236.34 of the Wisconsin Statutes, the following:

- 2.3.9.F.2.b.i Date of map preparation;
- 2.3.9.F.2.b.ii Graphic scale;
- 2.3.9.F.2.b.iii Names and addresses of the owner, subdivider and surveyor;
- 2.3.9.F.2.b.iv Parcel identification number

- **2.3.9.F.2.b.v** All existing buildings, watercourses, drainage ditches, road access and other features pertinent to proper division;
- **2.3.9.F.2.b.vi** Names of adjoining streets, highways, parkways, cemeteries, subdivisions, ponds, streams, lakes, flowages, and wetlands;
- **2.3.9.F.2.b.vii** Acreage included in each parcel, excluding road rights-of-way. If the survey map crosses a municipal boundary line, the acreage included in each portion of the parcel that is located in each municipality shall be shown on the map.
- **2.3.9.F.2.b.viii** The regional floodplain boundaries as designated on the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) dated April 2010.

2.3.9.F.2.b.ix Ordinary highwater mark of lakes, ponds, or streams;

An ordinary highwater mark of lakes, ponds and streams shall be shown on the certified survey map in accord with s. 236.025 Wis. Statutes, as determined by the Department of Natural Resources/pursuant to law, or shall be shown as "approximate" on the survey. If the ordinary high water mark is approximated, the location shall be a point on the bank to which the presence and action of the water is so continuous as to leave a distinct mark. Such approximate ordinary high water mark must be labeled "for reference only".

<u>Public trust information</u> – Any plat or CSM which includes lots or out-lots that go to the water's edge must include the following statement: "Any land below the ordinary highwater mark of a lake of navigable stream is subject to the public trust in navigable waters that is established under article IX, Section 1 of the State Constitution."

2.3.9.F.2.d Certificates

The surveyor shall certify on the map that he has fully complied with all the provisions of this Code. The Committee or the Land Use Administrator, acting as Deputy County Clerk, shall certify approval on the face of the map.

13. Modify and renumber Section 2.3.10.C.2 through 2.3.10.D.7 as follows:

2.3.10.C.2 Preparation of the Preliminary Plat

The Preliminary Plat shall be prepared in accordance with Chapter 236, Wisconsin Statutes and Chapter 7 of this Code. The subdivider or the subdivider's agent shall be required to submit an electronic copy of the Preliminary Plat and 4 copies of the plat that are capable of clearly legible reproduction, to this Department along with a complete major land division application and the applicable application fees at least 60 days prior to the meeting of the Committee at which action is desired. The subdivider shall also be required to submit the Preliminary Plat to the applicable approving agencies in accord with Chapter 236.12(2)(a) Wisconsin Statutes and to the State Department of Administration – State Plat Review Department in accord with Chapter 236.12(2)(ac) Wisconsin Statutes.

2.3.10.C.2 Referrals

The Land Use Administrator shall, within 2 days after filing, transmit copies of the application to those individuals and entities as required by Wis. Stat. 236.12, and may distribute the application to other reviewers the Land Use Administrator considers appropriate. The copies shall be distributed as follows:

- 2.3.10.C.2.a Two copies to the town board in which the plat is located;
- **2.3.10.C.2.b** Two copies to the clerk of each adjoining city or village if the subdivision lies within the extraterritorial plat approval jurisdiction of the city or village:
- **2.3.10.C.2.c** Two copies for each of the state agencies required to review the plat to the Wisconsin Department of Administration Plat Review or other state agency responsible for the review of plats

(i.e. State Department of Administration, State Department of Transportation, State Department of Commerce, etc.);

- 2.3.10.C.2.d Two copies to the school district in which the plat is located;
- 2.3.10.C.2.e Two copies to the sanitary district in which the site is located, if applicable;
- **2.3.10.C.2.f** One copy each to the County Highway Department, the Land Conservation Department, and all affected Utility Companies for their review and recommendations concerning matters within their jurisdictions; their recommendations, if any; shall be transmitted to the Committee within 30 days from the date the Preliminary Plat is filed.

2.3.10.C.3 Approving Agencies and Objecting Agencies

2.3.10.C.3.a Designation

The Committee, the town wherein the plat is located, and each adjoining city or village in whose extraterritorial plat approval jurisdiction the subdivision lies are designated approving agencies for purposes of this section. The Wisconsin Departments of Administration and Transportation shall be referred to as objecting agencies for purposes of this section.

2.3.10.C.3.b Objecting Agency Action

The objecting agencies shall, within 20 days of the date of receiving their copies of the Preliminary Plat, notify the subdivider and all other approving and objecting agencies of any objections. If there are no objections, they shall so certify on their copy of the Plat and shall return that copy to the Land Use Administrator. If an objecting agency fails to act within 20 days, it shall be deemed to have no objection to the Plat.

2.3.10.C.43 Land Use Administrator's Review and Recommendation

<u>Upon receipt of a complete preliminary plat application, the Land Use Administrator shall review each proposed Preliminary Plat in light of the Approval Criteria of Section 2.3.10(C)(10), and the comments received from approving and objecting agencies. Based on the results of those reviews, the Land Use Administrator shall recommend approval, approval with conditions, or denial of the application to the Committee. Failure of the Land Use Administrator to make a recommendation within 90 days of his receipt of the complete Preliminary Plat application shall constitute a recommendation for approval of the application unless the applicant agrees in writing to an extension of this period.</u>

2.3.10.C.5 4 Committee's Review and Decision

- 2.3.10.C.—4.a The Committee shall hold a public hearing on the Preliminary Plat application, which shall receive written and published notice pursuant to the general notice provisions of Section 2.2.6. Following the public hearing, the Committee shall by majority vote approve, approve conditionally, or reject the Preliminary Plat based on the Approval Criteria of Section 2.3.10(C)(40–8). Where, in the judgment of Committee, literal interpretation of the approval criteria or standards provided in Chapter 7 of this Code would result in exceptional or undue hardship, the Committee may waive or modify any requirements to the extent deemed necessary to relieve the exceptional or undue hardship. Such relief shall be granted without detriment to the public good, impairment of the purpose and intent of this Land Use Code, or conflict with the County Comprehensive Plan.
- **2.3.10.C.5 4.b** The Committee shall take its final action within 90 days of the date of filing of the Preliminary Plat with the Land Use Administrator, and shall state in writing any conditions of approval or reasons for rejection, unless the time is extended by agreement with the subdivider. Failure of the Committee to act within 90 days or within the time as extended by agreement with the subdivider shall constitute an approval.
- 2.3.10.C.5 4.c One copy of the Plat shall be returned to the subdivider with the date and action endorsed on it; and if approved conditionally or rejected, a letter setting forth the conditions of approval or the reasons for rejection shall accompany the Plat. One copy each of the Plat and letter shall be placed in the Department's permanent file.

2.3.10.C.6 5 Effect on Final Plat Approval

If the final plat conforms substantially to the preliminary plat as approved, including any conditions of that approval, and to local plans and ordinances adopted as authorized by law, it is entitled to approval. If the final plat is not submitted within 36 months after the last required approval of the preliminary plat, any approval authority may refuse to approve the final plat or may extend the time for submission of the final plat. The final plat may, if permitted by the approving authority, constitute only that portion of the approved preliminary plat that the subdivider proposes to record at that time.

Approval or conditional approval of a Preliminary Plat shall not constitute automatic approval of the Final Plat, except that if the Final Plat is submitted within 36 months after the last required approval of the Preliminary Plat, unless the time is extended by agreement with the subdivider and the final plat conforms substantially to the Preliminary Plat layout as indicated in Wis. Stat. Section 236.11 (1) (b), the Final Plat shall be entitled to approval with respect to such layout. The Preliminary Plat shall be deemed an expression of approval or conditional approval of the layout submitted as a guide to the preparation of the Final Plat which will be subject to further consideration by the Committee at the time of its submission.

2.3.10.C.7 6 Technical Disputes

As a means of resolving technical disputes between the applicant's licensed or registered professionals and the County, such disputes may be referred to the appropriate state department for a recommendation.

2.3.10.C.8 7 Expiration of Preliminary Plat Approval

An approved Preliminary Plat shall expire and be of no further force and effect if a complete Final Plat application for the subdivision or a phase of the subdivision has not been submitted within 36 months of the Preliminary Plat approval by the Committee. If the subdivision is to be developed in phases, a phasing plan shall be approved as part of the Preliminary Plat approval. If approval expires, the Land Use Administrator shall record an expiration of approval affidavit with the Dodge County Register of Deeds.

2.3.10.C.9 Preliminary Plats Within Extraterritorial Plat Approval Jurisdiction

When land to be subdivided lies within 1 ½ miles of the corporate limits of a fourth class city or village or within 3 miles of all other cities, and these cities or villages have adopted and exercise extraterritorial plat review, the subdivider shall proceed as specified in Sections (1) through (5) above, except:

- **2.3.10.C.9.a** Transmittal responsibility lies with the village clerk, city clerk, town clerk, or County Planning and Development Department to whomever the Plat is first submitted; and the subdivider shall indicate which one in his application.
- **2.3.10.C.9.b** Approving Agencies include the village plan commission or village board, or city plan commission or common council, town board, and the Committee, and the subdivider must comply with the land division ordinances of these agencies.
- **2.3.10.C.9.c** The subdivider may not proceed with the installation of any improvements as may be required by a town board, village board or city council in the matters over which they have jurisdiction until the Committee has received and approved or conditionally approved the Preliminary Plat.
- **2.3.10.C.9.d** All improvement requirements specified by the town board, village board, common council, County, or any special improvement district in matters over which they have jurisdiction, shall be met before filing of the Final Plat.

2.3.10.C.10 8 Approval Criteria

A Preliminary Plat may be approved by the Planning and Development Committee after considering whether:

- **2.3.10.C.10.8_a** The proposed subdivision furthers the goals and policies of the County's Comprehensive Plan;
- 2.3.10.C.10 8.b The proposed subdivision complies with the standards and design requirements of this Code;
- 2.3.10.C.10_8.c The proposed subdivision has made adequate provision for a water supply system that is sufficient in terms of quantity, dependability, and quality to provide an appropriate supply of water for the type of subdivision proposed;
- **2.3.10.C. 10.10 8.10 1.10 2.3.10.C. 10.10**
- **2.3.10.C.** 10 8.e The proposed subdivision can be accommodated within the school district in terms of the school's capacity to accept the estimated number of additional students;
- 2.3.10.C.10 8.f The proposed subdivision is compatible with the soil and topographical conditions of the site:
- **2.3.10.C. 40 8.g** The location of the proposed subdivision is suitable for development at this time and will not result in a premature subdivision or a scattered subdivision of land that leaves undeveloped parcels of land lacking urban services between developed parcels;
- 2.3.10.C.10 8.h A driveway access permit has been issued or a letter has been received indicating that such a permit will be issued:
- 2.3.10.C.10 8.j The subdivider has the financial ability to complete the proposed subdivision in accordance with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations; and
- 2.3.10.C.10 <u>8.k</u> The proposed subdivision has an approved soil erosion control plan and stormwater management plan.

2.3.10.D Final Plat

After approval of a Preliminary Plat, a Final Plat application for the subdivision may be submitted.

2.3.10.D.1 Application Filing

Final Plat applications shall be submitted to the Land Use Administrator.

2.3.10.D.1 Application Filing

Final Plat applications shall be submitted to the Land Use Administrator along with a Final Plat application form furnished by the Department.

2.3.10.D.2 Preparation of Final Plat

The Final Plat shall be prepared in accordance with Chapter 236, Wisconsin Statutes and Chapter 7 of this Code. The subdivider or the subdivider's agent shall be required to submit an electronic copy of the Final Plat and 4 copies of the plat that are capable of clearly legible reproduction, to this Department along with a complete Final Plat application and the applicable application fees at least 60 days prior to the meeting of the Committee at which action is desired. The subdivider shall also be required to submit the Final Plat to the applicable approving agencies and to the State Department of Administration – State Plat Review Department in accord with Chapter 236.12 Wisconsin Statutes.

2.3.10.D.2 Referrals

The Land Use Administrator shall, within 2 days after filing, transmit copies of the application to those individuals and entities as required by Wis. Stat. 236.12, and may distribute the application to other reviewers the Land Use Administrator considers appropriate. The copies shall be distributed as follows:

- 2.3.10.D.2.a Two copies to the Town Board in which the plat is located;
- 2.3.10.D.2.b Two copies to the clerk of each adjoining city or village if the subdivision lies within the extraterritorial plat approval jurisdiction of the city or village;
- **2.3.10.D.2.c** Two copies for each of the state agencies required to review the plat to the Wisconsin Department of Administration Plat Review or other state agency responsible for the review of plats (i.e. State Department of Administration, State Department of Transportation, State Department of Commerce, etc.);
- 2.3.10.D.2.d Two copies to the school district in which the site is located;
- 2.3.10.D.2.e Two copies to the sanitary district in which the site is located, if applicable;
- **2.3.10.D.2.f** One copy each to the County Highway Department, Land Conservation Department, and all affected utility companies for their review and recommendations concerning matters within their jurisdictions; their recommendations, if any, shall be transmitted to the Committee within 30 days from the date the Plat is filed.

2.3.10.D.3 Land Use Administrator's Action

The Land Use Administrator shall review each Final Plat application and shall provide the committee his or her conclusions as to whether the final plat conforms substantially to the preliminary plat and shall recommend that the Committee approve, approve with conditions or deny the Final Plat, based on the Approval Criteria of Section 2.3.10(D)(5). The recommendation shall be made part of the record of the proceeding at which the final plat is being considered.

2.3.10.D.5 Approval Criteria

The Committee may approve a Final Plat only if the Committee determines that the Final Plat substantially complies with the approved Preliminary Plat and includes all corrections and conditions imposed by the Committee during their approval of the Preliminary Plat; and complies with this Code and all other ordinances, rules, regulations, plans, and plan components which may affect it.

2.3.10.D.7 Submission Timing

If the Final Plat is not submitted within 36 months of the last required approval of the Preliminary Plat, the Committee may refuse to approve the Final Plat or may. The committee may extend the time for submission of the final plat.

14. Modify Section 2.3.12 through 2.3.12.H as follows:

2.3.12 Variances

In this subsection, an "Area Variance" means a modification to a dimensional, physical, or locational requirements such as the setback, frontage, height, bulk, or density restriction for a structure that is granted by the Board of Adjustment under this subsection and a "Use Variance" means an authorization by the Board of Adjustment under this subsection for the use of land for a purpose that is otherwise not allowed or is prohibited by the applicable code.

2.3.12.E.5 For a "Use Variance" that strict compliance with the provisions of this Code would leave the property owner with no reasonable use of the property in the absence of a variance; literal interpretation of the provisions of this Code will leave no practical use of the land or building; and

- **2.3.12.E.6** For an "Area Variance" that strict compliance with the provisions of this Code would unreasonably prevent the property owner from using the property owners property for a permitted purpose or would render conformity with the Code unnecessarily burdensome;
- **2.3.12.E.7** A variance may not be granted where the primary reason for obtaining a variance is to obtain a more profitable use of the property, personal inconvenience, construction error, economic gain, self-created hardship or where the property is presently a non-conforming use.

2.3.12.F Burden of Proof

In all circumstances, a property owner bears the burden of proving that the "unnecessary hardship" as it is used in subsections 2.3.12.E.5 and 2.3.12.E.6 is present and is based on conditions that are unique to the property, rather than considerations personal to the property owner and that the unnecessary hardship was not created by the property owner.

2.3.12.G Expiration of Approval

Any decision or order issued by the Board of Adjustment requiring the Land Use Administrator to issue a permit shall expire after one year after the decision is filed with the Department or at such alternative time specified in the approval process unless:

- 2.3.12.G.1 The applicant or appellant has filed a land use permit application with the Department for the applicable project within such time, provided, that the time may be extended when so specified by the Board of Adjustment.
- 2.3.12.G.2 Construction has been diligently pursued;
- 2.3.12.G.3 The land use permit is renewed, for a period not to exceed one year; or
- 2.3.12.G.4 A Certificate of Zoning Compliance has been issued.
- **2.3.12.H** A variance granted under this subsection runs with the land.

5.2.3.B Front or Street Yard Setback

A yard extending across the full width of a lot, the depth of which shall be measured as the minimum horizontal distance between the existing or proposed street, road or highway centerline and a line parallel thereto through the nearest point of the principal structure. Corner lots shall have two such yards. The street yard on a double frontage lot shall be the yard on which the principal structure faces and/or is addressed

5.2.3.C Rear Setback

A yard extending across the full width of the lot, the depth of which shall be measured as the minimum horizontal distance between the rear property or lot line and a line parallel thereto through the nearest point of the principal structure. A corner lot will have two side yard setbacks and no rear yard setback. The rear yard on a double frontage lot shall be the yard that is opposite the street yard on which the principal structure faces and/or is addressed.

17. Create Section 5.2.5 through 5.2.5.C as follows:

5.2.5 Accommodations for the Disabled

- 5.2.5.A The Committee or the Land Use Administrator may issue a Land Use Permit that waives specified Land Use Code requirements, if the Committee or Land Use Administrator determines that both of the following conditions have been met:
- <u>5.2.5.A.1</u> The requested accommodation (i.e. the requested waiver of land use code provisions), or other less-extensive accommodation is:
 - <u>5.2.5.A.1.a</u> Necessary to afford persons with disabilities equal access to public accommodations; and
 - 5.2.5.A.1.b The minimum accommodations that will give the persons with disabilities adequate relief.
- <u>5.2.5.A.2</u> The accommodation will not unreasonably undermine the basic purposes the Land Use Code seeks to achieve.
- 5.2.5.B In granting a waiver to specified land use code requirements under this provision, the Committee or the Land Use Administrator may require that the modifications granted to accommodate the disabilities shall be removed after no longer necessary.
- 5.2.5.C If a waiver is granted under this provision, the applicant shall be required to sign and record an affidavit with the Dodge County Register of Deeds office outlining the conditions and removal procedures associated with allowing accommodations for the disabled.
- 18. Modify Section 6.3.3.B as follows:

6.3.3.B Height

The maximum height of accessory buildings or structures shall not exceed 20 feet except as allowed under Section 5.1 5.1.2.N, 5.2.3.H.5 and 5.2.4.

19. Modify Section 7.1.1 as follows:

7.1.1 Applicability

The regulations of this chapter apply to all land divisions in Dodge County except those lands within incorporated municipalities, including, but not limited to, Major Subdivisions, Minor Land Divisions, replats, any other divisions of land for any purpose within Dodge County, and the preparation of plat maps and certified survey maps and other maps provided for by Wis. Stat. Chapter 236. All subdivisions and land divisions and any part thereof lying within the unincorporated parts of the County shall be made and all plat maps and certified survey maps shall be prepared and presented for approval as provided for in this Code. This chapter also expressly applies to any minor land division or subdivision created by the review and approval of a condominium instrument under Subsection 2.3.15.

20. Delete Section 7.3.10

7.3.10 Lot Merger

When two (2) or more legal lots of record are under common ownership and control and are contiguous, and one (1) or more of the lots is nonconforming to this Code as to lot area, lot frontage, lot width or lot depth, the owner shall be required to merge all contiguous, nonconforming lots with contiguous lots under common ownership and control until such contiguous, nonconforming lots are made conforming to the applicable lot area, lot frontage, lot width and lot depth provisions of the code unless an exception is provided for below.

- 7.3.10.A Exceptions The following lots shall be exempt from the lot merger provisions set forth in this section:
- **7.3.10.A.1** If at the time the lots described above become under common ownership or control, there is a lawful and preexisting principal structure on each lot, the owner shall not be required to merge the nonconforming lot or lots;
- **7.3.10.A.2** If at the time the lots described above became under common ownership or control, the lot size of each commonly owned contiguous lot contains 20,000 square feet or more in lot area and the minimum lot width for each lot is 100 feet or more, the owner shall not be required to merge the nonconforming lot or lots;
- **7.3.10.B** Solely for purposes of this subsection, a lot owned by one member of a married couple is not deemed to be owned by the married couple and is not deemed common ownership for purposes of merging nonconforming lots.

21. Modify Section 8.3 as follows:

8.3 Deleted (June 16, 2009)(Filling, grading, dredging provisions were moved to the Shoreland Overlay District)

8.3 FILLING, GRADING, DREDGING, DRAINING, DITCHING, TILING AND EXCAVATING

Filling, grading, dredging, draining, ditching, tiling and excavating may be permitted only in accordance with the erosion control and stormwater management provisions of Section 7.9 of the Dodge County Land Use Code, the applicable provisions of the Dodge County Shoreland Protection Ordinance, the applicable provisions of the Dodge County Floodplain Zoning Ordinance and other state and federal laws where applicable, and only when done in a manner to minimize sedimentation, water pollution, flooding, and related property and environmental damage caused by soil erosion and uncontrolled stormwater runoff during and after construction, in order to diminish the threats to public health, safety, welfare and the natural resources of Dodge County.

8.3.1.A PERMIT REQUIRED

Unless specifically exempted or waived by a provision of this Code, a land use permit is required for filling, grading, dredging, draining, ditching, tiling and excavating that meets any of the following criteria:

- 8.3.1.A.1 Disturbs 2,000 square feet or more of total land surface area;
- **8.3.1.A.2** Involves excavation or filling, or a combination of excavation and filling in excess of 400 cubic yards of material;
- **8.3.1.A.3** Disturbs 100 lineal feet of road ditch, grass waterway, or other land area where surface drainage flows in a defined open channel;
- **8.3.1.A.4** Involves excavation or filling, or a combination of excavation and filling on slopes of 12% or greater:

8.3.1.A.5 Involves tiling for agricultural purposes; or

8.3.1.A.6 Other land disturbing activities, including the installation of access drives that the Committee or Land Use Administrator determines to have a high risk of soil erosion or water pollution, or that may have a significant adverse impact on environmentally sensitive areas.

8.3.1.B Exemptions

- **8.3.1.B.1** The following sites shall be exempt from all of the requirements of this subsection, provided all such exempt activities are undertaken in a manner that presents no significant erosion or sedimentation hazard:
- **8.3.1.B.1.a** All activities directly relating to the planting, growing, and harvesting of agricultural crops except as required under Subsection 8.3.1.A.5.
- **8.3.1.B.1.b** Land disturbing activities exclusively subject to federal or state approval and enforcement, except as may voluntarily become subject to this Code through adopted memorandums of understanding or other, similar cooperative mechanisms.
- **8.3.1.B.1.c** Usual and customary site investigation and surveying activities undertaken prior to submittal of an application for preliminary subdivision approval, provided such activity shall not disturb more than 5,000 square feet of land area.
- **8.3.1.B.1.d** The construction of one- and two-family residential buildings on lots outside subdivisions, except those on slopes of 12 percent or greater, those sites with soil depths to bedrock of 60 inches or less, and sites with high water table shall be exempt from the construction site erosion control provisions of Subsection 7.9.5 of this Code.
- **8.3.1.B.1.e** Any proposal that is designed and/or certified by the Land Conservation Department as part of a soil conservation or water pollution control project shall comply with all of the requirements of this section, but may be exempted from obtaining a permit, providing a financial guarantee, or paying a fee.
- **8.3.1.B.1.f** Any road construction or other land disturbing or land development activity by the County, or any municipality within the County shall comply with all of the requirements of this section, but shall be exempted from any fees and financial guarantee requirements.

22. Modify Section 10.3.2. through 10.3.2.B.1 as follows:

10.3.2 Repairs, <u>Building</u>, <u>Maintenance</u>, <u>Additions</u> and <u>Enlargements</u> to <u>Legal Existing</u> **Nonconforming Structures** - The following repairs, rebuilding, maintenance, additions and enlargements to legal existing nonconforming structures are permitted by this code:

10.3.2.A Incidental Repairs and Normal Maintenance

Incidental repairs and normal maintenance of nonconforming structures shall be allowed without a County Land Use Permit unless such repairs or maintenance increase the extent of nonconformity or are otherwise expressly prohibited by this Code. For purposes of this section, "incidental repairs" shall mean repairs that are subordinate and minor in significance. Incidental repairs and normal maintenance repairs are not considered a modification or addition and are not considered an increase in the extent of the nonconformity; Incidental repairs and normal maintenance include painting, decorating, paneling, re-roofing or re-shingling a roof, replacing siding, replacement of doors, windows and other non-structural components and the maintenance, repair or replacement of existing private onsite wastewater treatment systems (POWTS) or water supply systems or connections to public utilities. Incidental repairs and ordinary maintenance repairs do not include any costs associated with the repair of a damaged structure. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent structures from being structurally strengthened or restored to a safe condition, in accordance with an official order of a public official.

10.3.2.B. Rebuilding, Additions and Modifications

No new basements, additional stories, lateral expansion or accessory construction outside of the perimeter of existing structure or building, except as allowed under this subsection, shall be permitted unless the proposed construction complies with all applicable provisions of this Code;

10.3.2.B.1 Rebuilding, repair or remodeling of a legal existing nonconforming structure is permitted provided the rebuilt, remodeled or repaired structure is confined to the existing three dimensional footprint of the legal existing nonconforming structure; The replacement of an existing porch or deck is permitted provided the replacement porch or deck is confined to the existing three dimensional footprint of the existing porch or deck;

23. Modify Section 10.5 Through 10.5.1.B as follows:

10.5 NONCONFORMING LOTS

In this subsection, a "substandard lot" means a legally created lot or parcel of record that met any applicable lot size requirements when it was created, but does not meet current lot size requirements.

10.5.1 Vacant Substandard Lots

In any residential or agricultural district, a single-family detached dwelling and its accessory structures may be erected on any vacant legal lot or parcel of record recorded in the County Register of Deeds Office before the effective date or amendment of this Code, subject to the requirements set forth below.

10.5.1.A Substandard Lots 20,000 Square Feet or Greater in Lot Area and 100 Feet in Lot Width

All requirements of the Code, except the dimensional requirements referenced in the title to this subsection, shall be met.

10.5.1.B Substandard Lots Less Than 20,000 Square Feet in Lot Area or 100 Feet in Lot Width

- **10.5.1.B.1** Such lot must be in separate ownership from abutting lands. If abutting lands and the substandard lot are owned by the same owner, the substandard lot shall not be sold or used without full compliance with the area requirements of this Code.
- 10.5.1.B.2 Such lot must be at least 50 feet wide and 7,500 square feet in area.

10.5.1 Substandard lots that do not meet the lot size requirements of the Code.

A legally created lot or parcel of record that met any applicable lot size requirements when it was created, but does not meet current lot size requirements may be used as a building site if all of the following apply:

- **10.5.1.A** The substandard lot or parcel has never been developed with one or more of its structures placed partly upon an adjacent lot or parcel.
- **10.5.1.B** The substandard lot or parcel is developed to comply with all other codes and ordinances of the political subdivision.
- 24. Delete Section 10.5.4:

(10.5.4 Lot Merger - Moved to Section 7.3.10 - September 18, 2012)

25. Modify the following definitions in Chapter 12 as follows:

Contiguous

Land that is abutting or touching at any point of which no part is separated by intervening land in other ownership, by a public road, street, or highway, by a municipal boundary, or by a navigable body of water.

Down Zoning Ordinance

A zoning ordinance that affects an area of land in one of the following ways:

- 1. By decreasing the development density of the land to be less dense than was allowed under its previous usage.
- 2. By reducing the permitted uses of land that are specified in a zoning ordinance or other land use regulation to fewer uses than were allowed under its previous usage.

Existing Requirements

Regulations, ordinances, rules, or other properly adopted requirements of a political subdivision that are in effect at the time the application for an approval is submitted to the political subdivision.

Front Yard

See Street Yard

Political Subdivision

Political Subdivision means a city, village, town or county.

Project

<u>Project means a specific and identifiable land development that occurs on defined and adjacent parcels of land, which includes lands separated by roads, waterways and easements.</u>

Rear Yard

A yard extending across the full width of the lot, the depth of which shall be the minimum horizontal distance between the rear lot line and a line parallel thereto through the nearest point of the principal structure. A corner lot shall have two side yards and no rear yard. The rear yard on a double frontage lot shall be the yard that is opposite the street yard on which the principal structure faces and/or is addressed.

Street Yard

A yard extending across the full width of the lot, the depth of which shall be the minimum horizontal distance between the existing or proposed street or highway line and a line parallel thereto through the nearest point of the principal structure. Corner lots shall have 2 such yards. The street yard on a double frontage lot shall be the yard on which the principal structure faces and/or is addressed.

Single Family Residential Use

Any structure or lot with one independent dwelling unit.



ORDINANCE NO.	999

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 7.04 OF CHAPTER 7 OF THE DODGE COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES TO REGULATE SPEED LIMITS. – COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAY Y AND YY, TOWN OF LEROY.

WHEREAS, in Section 7.01 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances, the Dodge County Board of Supervisors adopted, by reference, state statutes regulating the speed zones as set forth in Sections 346.57, 346.58, and 346.59, *Wisconsin Statutes*; and,

WHEREAS, penalties for violations of Chapter 7 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances are set forth within Section 7.20 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances, and subject to the enforcement procedures as set forth within Section 7.21 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances; and,

WHEREAS, the Dodge County Board of Supervisors has the specific authority under Sections 346.57, 346.58, and 346.59, *Wisconsin Statutes*, to adopt this ordinance relating to the maximum and minimum speed of vehicles; and,

SO, NOW, THEREFORE,

THE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF DODGE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Speed Zones.

a. CTH Y, 45 miles per hour from a point located 75 feet northerly of the centerline of Bauer Road, 860 feet northerly, Section 26 and 27 of the Town of Leroy, and 35 miles per hour from said point, northerly to the centerline of CTH Y and CTH YY to promote safety;

b. CTH YY, 35 miles per hour from the centerline of CTH Y and CTY YY Northerly, 545 feet; 45 miles per hour from said point northerly 3,450 feet, Section 22 and 23 of the Town of Leroy.

Section 2. Traffic Signs. Pursuant to Section 7.03 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances, the County Highway Department shall place appropriate traffic signs on the above-described highway(s) on or before the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 3. Enforcement. This ordinance shall be enforced by any officer employed by the Dodge County Sheriff's Office (the "Sheriff's Office") as set forth in Section 7.21 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances.

 Section 4. Penalties. Violation of this ordinance shall result in forfeiture pursuant to Sections 7.01 and 7.20 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances. In addition to those penalties, the County may remove any vehicle found to be in violation of this section. The cost of such removal shall be paid by the owner and the County shall not be liable for damage occasioned by such removal.

ORDINANCE NO.	1000

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 7 OF THE DODGE COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES, SPECIFYING CERTAIN SEGMENTS OF DODGE COUNTY TRUNK HIGHWAYS AS ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE AND UTILITY TERRAIN VEHICLE ROUTES.

The people of the County of Dodge, represented by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors, do hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1. Enabling Law. The Dodge County Board of Supervisors adopted on July 19, 2016, as Ordinance No. 955, a procedure for specifying designated segments of Dodge County Trunk Highways as All-Terrain Vehicle (ATVs) and Utility Terrain Vehicle (UTVs) routes (ATV routes), pursuant to Section 23.33, Wis. Stats.; and,

Section 2. On May 2, 2018, the Dodge County Highway Committee recommended that certain segment(s) of Dodge County Trunk Highways be designated as ATV and UTV routes, and be incorporated into Section 7.10 of the Doge County Code of Ordinances; and,

Section 3. Section 7.10(11)(e), of the Code is hereby amended to include the following segment(s) to the Dodge County ATV and UTV Routes:

* * * * * *

Dodge County Trunk Highway "T" from Torpy Road to Witt Lane, approximately 0.62 miles;

<u>Dodge County Trunk Highway "TT" from Breyer Road to Ghost Hill Road, approximately 1.40 miles;</u>

<u>Dodge County Trunk Highway "J" from Meadow Road to a point 0.21 miles west of the centerline of CTH "G", approximately 1.90 miles;</u>

Dodge County Trunk Highway "G" from CTH "GI" to CTH "I", approximately 1.52 miles;

Dodge County Trunk Highway "GI" from N. Kohn Road to CTH "G", approximately 1.00 miles;

<u>Dodge County Trunk Highway "G" from north Reeseville Village limits to Columbus Road, approximately 1.42 miles;</u>

Dodge County Trunk Highway "I" from Well Road to Cole Road, approximately 0.11 miles;

<u>Dodge County Trunk Highway "I" from a point 0.32 miles north of Lock Road to a point 0.15 miles west of the centerline of CTH "A", approximately 3.33 miles;</u>

<u>Dodge County Trunk Highway "KW" from Lowell Village limits to Cole Road, approximately</u> 1.42 miles;

Dodge County Trunk Highway "JK" from CTH "KW" to CTH "K", approximately 1.62 miles;

Dodge County Trunk Highway "K" from CTH "JK" to STH 16/60, approximately 1.00 miles;

<u>Dodge County Trunk Highway "J" from Reeseville Village limits to Elm Shade Road, approximately 8.62 miles;</u>

<u>Dodge County Trunk Highway "DJ" from Elm Shade Road to CTH "E", approximately 1.61 miles;</u>

Dodge County Trunk Highway "E" from CTH "DJ" to CTH "MM", approximately 1.14 miles;

Dodge County Trunk Highway "MM" from CTH "E" to CTH "EM", approximately 1.96 miles;

<u>Dodge County Trunk Highway "EM" from CTH "MM" – west leg to CTH "MM" – east leg, approximately 0.34 miles; and,</u>

<u>Dodge County Trunk Highway "MM" from CTH "EM" to Center Street, approximately 1.07 miles.</u>

Section 4. Traffic Signs. Pursuant to Section 7.03 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances, the County Highway Department shall place appropriate traffic signs on the above-described highway(s) on or before the effective date of this ordinance.

Section 5. Effective Date. This ordinance becomes effective immediately upon enactment by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors and publication and erection of required signs.

Section 6. Summary. An Ordinance Amendment to add segments to the Dodge County ATV and UTV Routes contained in Section 7.10.

An ordinance amending the Land Use Code, Dodge County, Wisconsin by placing certain lands in Section 8, T13N, R16E, Town of Leroy, in the A-2 General Agricultural zoning district.

Whereas the Dodge County Land Resources and Parks Committee has reviewed and considered the facts presented in the application and received at the public hearing relating to the subject matter of this ordinance for compliance with the criteria listed in Section 2.3.4.I of the Dodge County Land Use Code.

Whereas the Dodge County Land Resources and Parks Committee has found that the criteria listed in Section 2.3.4.I of the Dodge County Land Use Code can be met for this proposal and has further found that the proposal is substantially consistent with the Dodge County Comprehensive Plan and the stated purposes of the Dodge County Land Use Code. Furthermore, this Committee has found that the proposal will not result in significant adverse impacts upon the surrounding properties or the natural environment, that the land proposed for rezoning is suitable for development and will not have an unreasonable effect on rare or irreplaceable natural resources, that the proposal will not significantly impair or limit current or future agricultural use of the adjacent properties, be used to legitimize or spot zone a nonconforming use or structure and that the rezoning petition is the minimum action necessary to accomplish the intent of the petition.

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Dodge do ordain as follows:

Section 1. The "official zoning map" adopted with the Land Use Code, Dodge County, Wisconsin on March 21, 2000 is hereby amended as shown on the map attached hereto and made part of this ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be effective upon passage.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with or in contradiction of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.





Dodge County Board of Supervisors August 21, 2018 – 7:00 p.m. Administration Building - Juneau, Wisconsin

The August Session of the Dodge County Board of Supervisors was called to order by Chairman Russell Kottke at 7:00 p.m.

The Board rose to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken by the Clerk with all Supervisors being in attendance with the exception of Supervisors Nickel and Berres who had previously asked to be excused.







Furthermore, this Committee has found that the proposal will not result in significant adverse impacts upon the surrounding properties or the natural environment, that the land proposed for rezoning is suitable for development and will not have an unreasonable effect on rare or irreplaceable natural resources, that the proposal will not significantly impair or limit current or future agricultural use of the adjacent properties, be used to legitimize or spot zone a nonconforming use or structure and that the rezoning petition is the minimum action necessary to accomplish the intent of the petition.

Section 1. The "official zoning map" adopted with the Land Use Code, Dodge County, Wisconsin on March 21, 2000 is hereby amended as shown on the map attached hereto and made part of this ordinance.

Outside Financial Assistance: Funds provided by sources outside County government such as federal and state grants and aids, excluding service charges or indirect reimbursements.

County Cost: Funds to be provided by the County through tax levy, sales tax proceeds or long-term financing.





WHEREAS, since 2003, Dodge County has participated in the State of Wisconsin Health Plan administered by the Employee Trust Fund which offers health insurance coverage to local government employees of participating local government employers; and,

WHEREAS, in 2017, Dodge County began exploring alternatives to the State of Wisconsin Health Plan; and,

WHEREAS, Dodge County, Jefferson County, Cities of Beaver Dam, Jefferson, Fort Atkinson, Waterloo, Lake Mills and Whitewater ("municipalities"), in the spirit of intergovernmental cooperation and in the interest of pursuing efficiencies in government, have collaborated to solicit proposals for the provision of employee health insurance coverage; and,

WHEREAS, in 2018, with the assistance of M3 Insurance Solutions, Inc., a Request for Proposals ("RFP") for Health Insurance was developed and released; and,

WHEREAS, two responses to the RFP were received and evaluated, with Dean Health Plan ("Dean") providing the most competitive rates; and,

WHEREAS, the Human Resources and Labor Negotiation Committee has received multiple presentations regarding the Dean proposal, including a comparison to the current State Plan rates and the benefits of providing employees two plan options; and,

Section 1. The "official zoning map" adopted with the Land Use Code, Dodge County, Wisconsin on March 21, 2000 is hereby amended as shown on the map attached hereto and made part of this ordinance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be effective upon passage.



ORDINANCE NO. 1011

ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE AND UTILITY TERRAIN VEHICLE ROUTE ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 7, SECTION 7.10 ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLE AND UTILITY TERRAIN VEHICLE ROUTES, OF THE DODGE COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES.

The people of the County of Dodge, represented by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors, do hereby ordain as follows:

 Section 1. Enabling Law. The Dodge County Board of Supervisors adopted on July 19, 2016, as Ordinance No. 955, a procedure for specifying designated segments of Dodge County Trunk Highways as All-Terrain Vehicle (ATVs) and Utility Terrain Vehicle (UTVs) routes (ATV routes), pursuant to Section 23.33, Wis. Stats.; and,

Section 2. On October 3, 2018, the Dodge County Highway Committee recommended that all Dodge County Trunk Highways be designated as ATV and UTV routes, with segments opened for use when compliance with this Section 7.10 is achieved.

Section 3. Section 7.10 of the Code is hereby amended as follows:

- 23 (1) The terms "ATV," "UTV," "operator" and "ATV route," shall be defined as provided by § 23.33, Wis. Stats.
 - (23) The Dodge County Highway Committee (the "Highway Committee") is authorized to designate open for use segments of Dodge County Highways as ATV routes, in accordance with the provisions of § 23.33 Wis. Stats., and the provisions of this Section, and shall maintain the official list of open segments and publish same on the Dodge County website.
 - (32) The designation of a segment of a All Dodge County Trunk Highways as an are approved ATV routes. may be made based upon consideration of a All requests for such designation to open a specified segment by an individual or group of citizens who wish to sponsor the designation segment shall be submitted to the Highway Committee.
 - (4) A request for such designation to open specific segments shall be made on a form prescribed by the Highway Committee.
- (5) A sponsoring individual or group shall pay for the projected 10-year cost of procurement, installation, and maintenance of signs relating to such designation segment, as determined by the Dodge County Highway Department (the "Highway Department") after initial review of the request by the Highway Department. Signs shall include, at a minimum, approved signs designating the segment as an open ATV route, and signs indicating the speed limit for ATVs and UTVs if that limit is less than the speed limit for automobiles on the segment, and shall be posted at the beginning and end of each route segment. In addition, the Highway Department may specify additional signage requirements for all such designated segments. The Highway Department shall prepare an estimate of the cost of procurement.

- installation and maintenance of the signage over a projected period of 10 years and furnish such estimate to the sponsor. The calculation of the cost of procurement may take into account any in-kind contribution of signs made by the Sponsor and accepted by the Highway Department.
- (6) The Highway Department shall make a report and recommendation to the Highway Committee regarding any request for designation the opening of a segment of a county trunk highway as an ATV route. The report shall include information regarding the topography, traffic patterns and uses, and other information which may bear on the safety and appropriateness of the proposed designation, including information provided by the Dodge County Sheriff's Office. In addition, the report and recommendation shall include recommendations regarding:
 - (a) Reduced speed limits for ATVs/UTVs within the segment; and

- (b) Time of day limitations (expressed in hours or with reference to daylight conditions) for ATV/UTV operation within the proposed ATV route;
- (7) A sponsor of a designation segment shall tender funds equal to the estimated cost of procurement, installation, and maintenance of the route signage prior to any approval of the Highway Committee of the designation request. Those funds shall be retained by the Highway Department and used to offset the cost of procurement, installation, and maintenance of signage on the ATV route segment. If the Highway Committee denies a sponsor's request for approval of a proposed ATV route, or if the County Board of Supervisors declines to enact a County Ordinance granting final approval of the same, those funds shall be returned in full to the sponsor which tendered the funds.
- 23 (8) The speed limit for ATVs and UTVs shall be established at not greater than 35 miles per 24 hour or the speed limit for automobiles, whichever is lower, on all segments of county trunk 25 highways designated as ATV routes.
 - (9) The Highway Committee may, at a duly noticed meeting during which an opportunity is afforded for input and comment by members of the public, designate authorize opening segments of a County Trunk Highway as ATV routes, and may specify speed limits for ATVs/UTVs operating on such route, and time of day limitations on operation of ATVs/UTVs on such route, all of which shall be subject to final approval by the enactment of a County Ordinance by the County Board of Supervisors approving the same. The designation opening of any segment of a County Trunk Highway located within an incorporated municipality shall not take effect until the governing body of such municipality has passed a resolution approving the same.
 - (10) General Limitations. The following limitations apply on all county trunk highway segments designated opened as ATV routes:
 - (a) Operators must abide by all traffic laws unless further restricted by this Section.
 - (b) No ATV/UTV shall be operated at a speed greater than that established by the Highway Committee for the ATV route segment or the posted limit applicable to automobiles, whichever is lower.
 - (c) ATVs/UTVs may be operated on paved surfaces only, unless yielding the right-of-way.
- (d) No ATV/UTV may be operated on any designated open route without fully functional headlights, tail-lights, and brake lights.
 - (e) No ATV/UTV may be operated on any designated open route between the hours of 11:59 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. daily, unless a different restriction on hours of operation has

- been specified by the Highway Committee in creating or modifying the designation of a <u>for the open</u> segment of County Trunk Highway and notice of the same is duly posted on the segment.
 - (f) All ATV/UTV operators shall ride in single file.
 - (g) All ATV/UTV operators shall ride on the right hand side of the paved portion of the highway, unless making a left turn. Operation on the gravel shoulders, grassy in-slope, ditches, or other highway right-of-way is prohibited, unless yielding right-of-way.
 - (h) No ATV/UTV may be operated on any designated open ATV route if the ATV/UTV does not meet all applicable Federal noise and air pollution standards.
 - (i) No person under the age of 16 may operate an ATV/UTV on any <u>open</u> segment of a County Trunk Highway which is a designated ATV route.
 - (j) No person under the age of 18 may operate an ATV/UTV on any designated open segment ATV route unless wearing approved protective head gear.
 - (k) Every person who operates an ATV/UTV on a <u>an open</u> segment of County Trunk Highway which is designated as an ATV route shall have in his or her immediate possession a valid motor vehicle operator's license, and shall display the license document upon demand from any law enforcement officer or official described in § 23.33(12), Wis. Stats.
- (11) ATV Routes. (Am. #956; #964)

- (a) All County highways designated as are designated ATV routes shall be established and approved by the Highway Committee, subject to final approval by the enactment of a County Ordinance by the County Board of Supervisors approving the same subject to approval of the Highway Committee opening the specified segment for use and the installation of proper signage. The Highway Department shall provide to the Sheriff's Office current records specifying those segments of County Trunk Highways which have been designated ATV routes open for use and properly signed.
- (b) The County Board of Supervisors may rescind or modify the designation of an ATV route by repeal of an ordinance granting final approval of such designation or by enactment of an ordinance modifying such designation.
- (eb) The Highway Committee may temporarily modify or suspend any designation of an ATV Route the use of any opened segment. In addition, the Dodge County Highway Commissioner (the "Highway Commissioner") may, without prior approval of the Highway Committee, modify or suspend any designation of an ATV route made under this Ordinance whenever emergency conditions so require, for up to 120 days.
- (dc) In the event that the County Board of Supervisors takes an action rescinding or terminating a designation of an ATV route made under this ordinance within 10 years of such designation its initial adoption, the Highway Department shall refund to the sponsor of such designation any unexpended funds remaining of the funds tendered by such sponsor for the signage of such designation, less an administrative charge equal to 5% of the funds originally tendered.

(12) Route Signs.

- (a) No County Trunk Highway or segment thereof shall be used as an ATV/UTV route until approved by the Highway Committee and properly signed as provided herein.
- (a**b**) All required designated route signs shall be installed and maintained by the Highway Department.
- (bc) All signs posted shall be in compliance with Federal and State Statutes.
- (e<u>d</u>) No person may erect, remove, obscure, or deface any official designated route sign unless authorized by the Highway Commissioner.
- (de) No person shall operate an ATV/UTV contrary to any authorized and official posted sign.
- 12 (13) Enforcement.
 - (a) This Section shall be enforced by any officer employed by the Dodge County Sheriff's Office (the "Sheriff's Office") or any other law enforcement official as set forth in § 23.33(12), Wis. Stats., and Dodge County Section 7.21.
 - (b) Nothing in this Section shall prohibit any law enforcement officer or DNR warden from proceeding under any other ordinance, regulation, statute, law or order that pertains to the subject matter addressed under this Section.
 - (14) Penalties. Operation of an ATV/UTV in violation of any provision of this Section shall result in forfeiture pursuant to Dodge County Code of Ordinances Sections 7.01 and 7.20, and subject to the enforcement procedures set forth in Dodge County Code of Ordinances Section 7.21. The penalty for operation of an ATV or UTV in violation of any provision of this Ordinance for which a penalty is not otherwise specified shall be a forfeiture of \$30.00 plus the costs and fees imposed under Ch. 814, Wis. Stats.
 - (15) Maintenance. Designation of segments of the Dodge County Highway System as ATV/UTV routes does not impose upon the Highway Department a greater duty of care or responsibility for maintenance of those <u>open</u> segments than for any other segment of county highway. Operators of ATV/UTV's on county highways assume all the usual and normal risks of ATV/UTV operation.
- Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance becomes effective immediately upon enactment by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors and publication.
- Section 5. Summary. An Ordinance amending Section 7.10 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances pertaining to records retention.
- **Section 6. Vote Required.** Majority of members present.

Dodge County Board of Supervisors November 13, 2018 – 9:00 a.m. Administration Building - Juneau, Wisconsin

The November Session of the Dodge County Board of Supervisors was called to order by Chairman Russell Kottke at 9:00 a.m.

The Board rose to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken by the Clerk with all Supervisors being in attendance with the exception of Supervisor Bennett who had previously asked to be excused.

Chairman Kottke called for approval of the minutes. A motion was made by Supervisor Nickel and seconded by Supervisor Schraufnagel to approve the minutes of the October 23, 2018, session of the County Board meeting as recorded, and dispense with the reading of the minutes. The motion passed by acclamation with no negative votes cast, and was so ordered by the Chairman.

Communications on File

Karen J. Gibson, County Clerk, reported there were no communications on file.

Special Orders of Business

Chairman Kottke then called the Third Special Order of Business: Confirm Appointment made by County Board Administrator, James Mielke. Reappoint Robert Patrouille to the Veterans Service Commission for a three year term, commencing on December 1, 2018 to December 1, 2021, both inclusive. A motion to accept the reappointment was made by Supervisor Nickel and seconded by Supervisor Miller. The motion passed by acclamation with no negative votes cast, thereby approving the reappointment.

The following Resolutions and Reports were read by the Clerk and acted upon by the Board:

Resolution No. 18-52 Authorizing the Purchase of Certain Hardware, Software and Services for Information Technology Infrastructure Upgrades – Information Technology Committee. A motion for adoption was made by Supervisor Maly and seconded by Supervisor Wurtz. Question by Supervisor Houchin answered by Chairman Kottke. The vote was cast with 31 ayes and 1 no. Supervisor J. Schmitt informed Chairman Kottke that he had meant to vote yes. With changing Supervisor J. Schmitt's vote to a yes, the vote was cast with all voting in the affirmative, thereby adopting the Resolution.

A motion for adoption was made by Supervisor Bischoff and seconded by Supervisor D. Schmitt. The vote was cast with 30 ayes and 2 noes, thereby adopting the Resolution.

Resolution No. 18-54 2019 Dodge County Budget Appropriation – Finance Committee. A motion for adoption was made by Supervisor Frohling and seconded by Supervisor Benter. Chairman Kottke asked County Administrator, James Mielke to come forward and present the budget. Mr. Mielke gave a power point presentation that summarized the 2019 Dodge County Budget. Mr. Mielke stated that the proposed tax levy is \$34,033,789 resulting in a mill rate of \$5.40 per \$1,000 of equalized assessed valuation, which is a \$0.10 cent decrease for the 2019 budget. Supervisor Fink made a motion to amend the 2019 Dodge County Budget by removing \$115,000 for Juneau Roof Replacement from 2019 Highway Budget (Decrease Expense), apply \$233,000 Highway Fund Balance (Increase Revenue) and include estimated GTA of \$2,782,501 in place of estimated GTA of \$3,129,645. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Caine. The vote was cast on Supervisor Fink's motion to amend with 30 ayes and 2 noes, thereby approving the motion to amend.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF INCREASED FUNDING IN THE CHILDREN AND FAMILY AIDS ALLOCATION

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF DODGE COUNTY, WISCONSIN,

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families provides funding to counties through the Children and Family Aids (CFA) allocation for the provision of child abuse and neglect services, including prevention, investigation, treatment, and out-of-home placement costs; and,

WHEREAS, base funding for statewide child welfare services has only increased once since the Wisconsin Department of Children and Families was created in 2009, by \$5 million in 2018; and,

WHEREAS, from 2013 to 2017, out-of-home care costs have increased 18% statewide, from \$81.4 million to \$95.7 million; and,

WHEREAS, county tax levy currently represents 63% of funding for child welfare services; however, counties are only required to match the CFA allocation at 9.89%, therefore, the county overmatch rate is currently exceeds 1600%; and,

WHEREAS, over the past few years, the child welfare workload has increased to unacceptable and unmanageable ratios in all counties across the state, resulting in a greater risk of negative outcomes for children and families; and,

WHEREAS, counties are struggling to recruit and retain child welfare workers due to these high caseload ratios, with increasing stress taking its toll and causing many experienced child welfare workers to leave the profession; and,

 WHEREAS, the total number of child protective services (CPS) referrals statewide has increased by 43% since 2007 – from 55,895 CPS referrals in 2007 to 79,693 CPS referrals in 2017; and the total number of CPS referrals in Dodge County has increased by 37% since 2014 – from 526 CPS referrals in 2014 to 723 CPS referrals through September 2018; and,

WHEREAS, the total number of children in out-of-home care statewide has increased by 24% from 2012 through Q1 of 2018 – from 6,263 children in 2012 to 7,802 children by March 2018; and the total number of children in out-of-home care in Dodge County has increased by 60% since January 2014 – from 50 children in out-of-home care in January 2014 to 80 children in out-of-home care in August 2018; and,

WHEREAS, the total number of screened-in CPS reports statewide has increased by 9% since 2011 – from 18,706 screened-in CPS reports in 2011 to 27,226 screened-in CPS reports in 2017; and the total number of screened-in CPS reports in Dodge County has increased by 9% since 2012 – from 278 screened-in CPS reports in 2012 to 304 screened-in CPS reports in 2017; and,

 WHEREAS, the total percentage of children removed from their home statewide because of caretaker drug abuse has increased 119% since 2011; and the total percentage of children removed from their home in Dodge County because of caretaker drug abuse has increased 35% since 2014; and,

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WHEREAS, the total number of Children in Need of Protection and Services (CHIPS) petitions filed with the court statewide has increased 15% from 2008 to 2017; and the total number of CHIPS petitions filed with the court in Dodge County has increased by 62% since 2012 – from 47 CHIPS petitions filed with the court in 2012 to 76 CHIPS petitions filed with the court in 2017; and,

WHEREAS, a leading cause of these increases is the use of heroin, opiates, and methamphetamines by caretakers; and,

WHEREAS, it is critical that counties have the resources necessary to ensure the safety of children in all areas of the state; and,

WHEREAS, with the county tax levy caps, counties are struggling to identify resources to increase child welfare staff, especially given the significant overmatch counties already put into the human services system;

SO, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Dodge County Board of Supervisors does hereby request that the state of Wisconsin, in its 2019-2021 state biennial budget, increase funding to counties in the Children and Family Aids allocation by the amount of \$30 million annually, to assist counties in serving the increasing number of children and families in the child welfare system; and,

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Dodge County Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to transmit a copy of this Resolution to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, all Wisconsin State Legislators with a constituency within Dodge County, and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

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

ORDINANCE NO.	1016

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 7, SECTION 7.09 STOPPING, STANDING, OR PARKING OF VEHICLES, OF THE DODGE COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES.

The people of the County of Dodge, represented by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors, do hereby ordain as follows:

- Section 1. Enabling Law. The Dodge County Board of Supervisors has the specific authority under Section 349.13, *Wisconsin Statutes*, to adopt this ordinance and limit the time of, or otherwise restrict, the stopping, standing, or parking of vehicles on highways over which it has jurisdiction, beyond the prohibitions, limitations, or restrictions imposed by Chapter 346, *Wisconsin Statutes*; and,
- **Section 2.** On November 15, 2018, the Dodge County Highway Committee recommended that a restriction of parking on the east side of a certain segment of County Trunk Highway S is necessary to promote safety; and,
- **Section 3.** Section 7.09(1) of the Code is hereby amended as follows:
 - 1. The provisions of §§ 346.50 346.55, *Wis. Stats.*, relating to the stopping, standing, or parking of vehicles are hereby adopted as part of this section as if fully set forth herein. In addition, the Dodge County Board of Supervisors has declared that the stopping, standing, or parking of vehicles on the following county highways in Dodge County is subject to the following restrictions and limitations:
 - a. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on the east side of CTH T starting at a point 460 north of the centerline of STH 16/60 to a point 710 feet further north.
 - b. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on the west side of CTH T starting at a point 775 feet north of the centerline of STH 16/60 to a point 123 feet further north.
 - c. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on the east side of CTH I from Main Street to Taylor Street, Town of Portland, Dodge County.
 - d. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on CTH S from a point 500' east of the Wisconsin & Southern Railroad to a point 1,250' west in Sections 14 and 23, T. 11 N., R. 16 E., Town of Hubbard.
- **Section 4.** Traffic Signs. Pursuant to Section 7.03 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances, the County Highway Department shall place appropriate traffic signs on the above-described highway(s) on or before the effective date of this ordinance amendment.
- **Section 5. Effective Date.** This ordinance becomes effective immediately upon enactment by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors and publication.
- **Section 6.** Summary. An Ordinance amending Section 7.09(1) of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances pertaining to restricting parking on a portion of CTH S.

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ORDINANCE NO. 1017

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2, SECTION 2.02 – STANDING COMMITTEES, BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS; CHAPTER 19, PARKS AND RECREATION; AND REVISOR'S AMENDMENTS, OF THE DODGE COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES.

The people of the County of Dodge, represented by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors, do hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1. Prior to the codification of previously adopted but not yet codified ordinance amendments, the Dodge County Departments evaluated the Dodge County Code of Ordinances to identify non-substantive edits.

Section 2. On December 4, 2018, the Dodge County Executive Committee considered the non-substantive edits submitted by Dodge County Departments and recommended amending Chapters 2 and 19 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances.

Section 3: Chapters 2 and 19 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances are hereby amended to read as follows:

Chapter 2 - THE GOVERNING BODY

2.02 - STANDING COMMITTEES, BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

 (12) LAND INFORMATION COMMITTEE. (Am. #16-100) The Land Information Committee shall be comprised of 5 Board members. The 5 members shall be appointed by the Chairman and confirmed by the Board. In appointing members to this Committee, the County Board Chairman shall seek to represent the interests of the 5 departments using land records, namely the County Treasurer, Land Resources and Parks, Land and Water Conservation, Highway, and Sheriff. The Committee shall be responsible for land records modernization to promote and facilitate timely access to information, decisions based upon accurate information, and efficiency in government with the goal of establishment of an integrated, technologically sound, countywide land information system. The Committee shall act as an advisory and policy-making body for the Land Information Division of the Land Resources and Parks Department. The Committee shall also act as an advisory and policy-making body, to the extent permitted by law, for the Office of the Register of Deeds.

(14) PLANNING, DEVELOPMENT LAND RESOURCES AND PARKS COMMITTEE. The Planning, Development Land Resources and Parks Committee shall be comprised of 5 Board members. The 5 members shall be appointed by the Chairman and confirmed by the Board. The Committee shall be designated as the County Zoning Agency authorized to act in all matters pertaining to County planning and zoning under § 59.69(2)(a), Wis. Stats. In addition, The Committee shall be responsible for subdividing, sanitation, and economic development, land records modernization, and a countywide land information system. The Committee

1 shall be an advisory and policy-making body for all divisions of the following Land Resources and Parks Department divisions: Code Administration, Parks and Trails, and Planning and 2 Economic Development and, to the extent permitted by law, the Office of the Register of Deeds. Chapter 19 - PARKS AND RECREATION 19.02 - APPLICABILITY . (Am. #933) This chapter shall apply to the following Dodge County Parks, **Trails** and recreational facilities: Astico. Derge, Harnischfeger, Ledge, Nitschke Mounds, the Wild Goose State Trail, the Glacial River Trail, the Gold Star Memorial Trail, the Dodge County Snowmobile Trail, the Dodge County All-Terrain Vehicle Trail and properties or facilities subsequently added to the Dodge County Park System or under the jurisdiction of the Dodge County Planning, Development Land **Resources** and Parks Committee. 19.03 - TERMS AND DEFINITIONS . (Am. #933) For the purpose of this chapter, the following definitions apply: Committee. The Dodge County Planning, Development Land Resources and Parks Committee or any successor committee duly charged by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors with the Dodge County Park System responsibilities and jurisdiction. Juvenile Group. A group made up of juvenile members of an established organization and under the leadership of at least one competent, mature adult for each 10 juveniles in the group and using any number of camping units or occupying a group campground campsite. Park. Includes the recreational grounds, buildings and facilities thereon, and waters therein or other recreational areas, trails or facilities which are under the jurisdiction of the Committee. Special Use Permit. A permit issued by the Committee or Department to allow an applicant to undertake an activity in a park, trail or recreational property under the Department's jurisdiction that would normally by be prohibited under this Chapter or established policies. Conditions and fees may be established for the requested use.

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- 1 19.04 PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES AND PARK REGULATIONS . (Am. #933)
- 2 The following activities shall be prohibited in any Dodge County Park unless prior documented
- 3 approval or Special Use Permit is obtained from the Department:
- 4 (1) HORSES.
- 5 (a) The riding of horses in any park or trail except in specifically designated or posted areas.

- (3) TRAVEL AND PARKING OF MOTORIZED VEHICLES.
 - (g) Operating any unauthorized motorized vehicle on the Wild Goose State Trail, Glacial River Trail or Gold Star Memorial Trail.

- 19.05 PARK HOURS . (Am. #933)
- 14 (2) The Department may establish and post different hours for the above listed parks or other parks, **trails** and recreation areas, when and where it is deemed appropriate.
 - (4) It shall be unlawful for any person to be in any County park outside of park hours, unless otherwise posted, except registered campers in designated campground campsites, or persons using the Derge Park boat launch or shoreline for the sole purpose of fishing or boating, or persons using the Wild Goose State Trail, Glacial River Trail or Gold Star Memorial Trail for the sole purpose of recreating by hiking, biking, snowmobiling, ATV riding, or other authorized trail activity.

Section 4. Revisor's Amendments. By adopting this ordinance amendment, the revisor shall edit the Code of Ordinances throughout by changing "Sheriff's Department" to "Sheriff's Office" and such other edits and formatting to correct typos and the non-substantive changes.

Section 5. Effective Date. This ordinance becomes effective immediately upon enactment by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors and publication.

Section 6. Summary. An Ordinance creating Subsection 3.06(4) of Section 3.06 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances pertaining to fees for certain county services.

Section 7. Vote Required. Majority of members present.

The Behavioral Health facilities saw a large number of residents covered by Managed Care Organizations rather than by Other Counties. Additionally significant increases in the Medicaid rate for our three facilities realized substantial unbudgeted revenues. The Nursing Home saw higher than expected Medicare Advantage and Medicare B revenues. 

On March 5, 2019, the Dodge County Executive Committee recommended creating 10 Section 3.09 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances. 11 12 Section 2: Section 3.09 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances is hereby created to read as 13 14 follows: 15 16 Section 3.09 - PROPERTY ASSESSED CLEAN ENERGY (PACE) FINANCING. 17 (1) PURPOSE. Dodge County finds that renovations or additions to premises located in Dodge 18 County made to improve energy efficiency, improve water efficiency, and/or use renewable 19 resource applications, increase property values, stimulate local economic activity, provide local 20 and global environmental benefits, and promote the general welfare of Dodge County residents. 21 The purpose of this Section is to facilitate loans arranged by property owners or lessees to make 22 such improvements by treating loan principal and interest, fees, and other charges as special 23 24 charges eligible for inclusion on the tax roll for these properties. 25 (2) STATUTORY AUTHORITY. This ordinance is enacted pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, as 26 amended, which authorizes a County to enter into an agreement regarding loan repayments to a 27 3rd party for owner-arranged or lessee-arranged financing, to an owner or a lessee of a premises 28 located in Dodge County for making or installing an energy efficiency improvement, a water 29 efficiency improvement or a renewable resource application to a premises. 30 31 (3) DEFINITIONS. In this section: 32 33 (a) "Annual installment" means the portion of the PACE loan that is due and payable for a 34 particular year under the supplemental agreement. 35 36 (b) "Borrower" means the property owner or lessee of the subject property that borrows 37 the proceeds of a PACE loan. 38 39 40 (c) "Default loan balance" means the outstanding balance, whether or not due, of a PACE loan at the time that Dodge County receives foreclosure proceeds. 41 42 (d) "Foreclosure proceeds" means the proceeds received by Dodge County from the 43 disposition of a subject property through an in rem property tax foreclosure. 44 45 (e) "Loan amount" means the principal, interest, administrative fees (including the Program 46 47 Administrator's fees) and other loan charges to be paid by the borrower under the PACE 48 loan. 49 (f) "PACE" means the acronym for property assessed clean energy. 50

(g) "PACE default provisions" means:

- 1. The delinquent annual installment(s) due when Dodge County initiates the *in rem* property tax foreclosure on the subject property;
- 2. Any additional annual installment(s) that become due between the time that Dodge County initiates *in rem* property tax foreclosure on the subject property and the date Dodge County receives the foreclosure proceeds;
- 3. Any default interest charges applied to unpaid annual installments referenced in subs. (1.) and (2.) above, as provided in the supplemental agreement; and
- 4. Any default loan balance.
- (h) "PACE lender" means any person that makes a PACE loan, and which may include an affiliate of the borrower.
- (i) "PACE loan" means a loan made by a PACE lender to a borrower under this Section for energy efficiency improvements, water efficiency improvements, or renewable resource applications made to or installed on a subject property.
- (j) "Person" means any individual, association, firm, corporation, partnership, limited liability company, trust, joint venture or other legal entity, or a political subdivision as defined in Wis. Stat. § 66.0627.
- (k) "Program Administrator" means the person retained by the Wisconsin PACE Commission as provided in subsection (5)(b).
- (I) "Subject property" means any premises located in Dodge County on which an energy efficiency improvements, water efficiency improvements, or renewable resource applications are being or have been made and financed through an outstanding PACE loan.
- (m) "Supplemental agreement" means a written agreement among a borrower, a PACE lender and Dodge County, as provided for in subsection (7).
- (n) "Wisconsin PACE Commission" means the Wisconsin PACE Commission formed under Wis. Stat. § 66.0301, as amended, by Dodge County and one or more other political subdivisions as defined in Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, pursuant to a Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement relating to the Wisconsin PACE Commission.

Stat. §66.0627 as amended.

- (b) Prior to executing the supplemental agreement, the owner of the subject property, if different from the borrower, and any existing mortgage holder(s) on the subject property must have executed a separate writing acknowledging the borrower's use of PACE financing for the subject property and the special charge that will be imposed under this Section and its consequences, including the remedies for collecting the special charge.
- (c) Each PACE loan shall be amortized over the term of the PACE loan as provided in the supplemental agreement.
- (d) The annual payments of a PACE loan may be payable in installments as authorized by Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, as amended.
- (8) ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS ADDED TO TAX ROLLS. Upon the request of the Program Administrator, Dodge County shall place each year's annual installment on the tax roll for the subject property as permitted pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 66.0627, as amended.
- (9) REMITTANCE OF SPECIAL CHARGES. Dodge County shall promptly remit to the Wisconsin PACE Commission any payment(s) for a special charge imposed under this Section, including penalties and charges thereon, it may receive from any taxing district or Dodge County treasurer pursuant to Wis. Stat. Ch. 74, as amended.
- (10) PROPERTY TAX FORECLOSURE PROCEDURES.
 - (a) Dodge County elects to utilize the provisions of Wis. Stat. § 75.521, as amended, for the purpose of enforcing tax liens if a subject property owner fails to pay any special charges imposed on the subject property under this Section as required.
 - (b) Dodge County shall begin an in rem property tax foreclosure proceeding on the subject property at the earliest time allowed under Wisconsin Statutes, unless the Dodge County Taxation Committee determines that subject property is a "brownfield" (as defined is Wis. Stat. § 75.106, as amended) or that in rem property tax foreclosure is not in the best interests of Dodge County due to the condition of the property or for other reasons as determined by the Taxation Committee.
 - (c) If the Taxation Committee determines that it does not wish to obtain judgment on a subject property, the PACE lender may request that Dodge County, pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 75.106, as amended, commence an in rem proceeding against the subject property and assign Dodge County's right to take judgment against the subject property to the PACE lender, provided that the PACE lender and Dodge County comply with all provisions of Wis. Stat. § 75.106, as amended, concerning the subject property and the PACE lender

agrees to pay the amount required by Wis. Stat. § 75.36(3)(a)1, 1m, and 3.
