# Dodge County Board of Supervisors July 21, 2020 – 7:00 p.m. Administration Building - Juneau, Wisconsin

The July Session of the Dodge County Board of Supervisors was called to order by Chairman Russell Kottke at 7:00 p.m.

The Board rose to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken by the Clerk with all Supervisors being in attendance with the exception of Supervisor Nickel who had previously asked to be excused. Supervisors Hedrick, Maly, Miller and Schraufnagel appeared via teleconference.

Chairman Kottke called for approval of the minutes. Chairman Kottke stated a change had been made to the minutes and asked Karen J. Gibson, County Clerk to read the change. The Clerk stated the June 16, 2020 draft minutes were changed as follows: On Page 3, change the word suggested to stated and add the word would. The County Board of Supervisors discussed the draft Ordinance and Chairman Kottke stated that the Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA) formed a Public Health Committee and Chairman Kottke suggested stated Dodge County would delay action on the Ordinance until the WCA Committee provides guidance. Ouestions by Supervisors Berres answered by Chairman Kottke. A motion was made by Supervisor D. Schmidt and seconded by Supervisor Benter to approve the minutes of the June 16, 2020, session of the County Board meeting as corrected. Comments by Supervisors Boelk and J. Schmitt and Chairman Kottke. Ms. Nass advised that Chairman Kottke proceeded under Rule 14 on the Ordinance at the June 16, 2020 meeting and under that Rule, the Chairman can layover any item on the agenda for examination. Comment by Supervisors Hilbert. Motion by Supervisor Guckenberger to add to the minutes that the Chairman delayed action on the Ordinance per Rule 14. The motion to amend was seconded by Supervisor Derr. Motion carried. Corporation Counsel Kimberly Nass suggested the amendment to the minutes read as follows: The County Board of Supervisors discussed the draft Ordinance and Chairman Kottke stated that the Wisconsin Counties Association (WCA) formed a Public Health Committee and Chairman Kottke stated Dodge County would delay action per Rule 14 on the Ordinance until the WCA Committee provides guidance. The motion to approve the minutes as amended carried.

# **Special Orders of Business**

Chairman Kottke called the First Order of Business: Confirm Appointments made by County Administrator, James Mielke. Reappoint Jody Langfeldt and Lorna Negen to the Commission on Aging and Disability Services for three year terms, commencing on July 1, 2020 to July 1, 2023, both inclusive. A motion to accept the reappointments was made by Supervisor Behl and seconded by Supervisor Greshay. Motion carried.

Chairman Kottke called upon Supervisor Bobholz, Chairman, Human Services and Health Board who introduced Abby Sauer, Public Health Officer, Human Services and Health Department who gave an update on COVID-19 and Dodge County Public Health Officer Guidelines. Questions by Supervisors Greshay and Houchin answered by Ms. Sauer. Comment by Supervisor Burnett. Chairman Kottke thanked Ms. Sauer for the great job that she is doing.

Chairman Kottke called upon Supervisor Frohling, Chairman, Finance Committee who introduced Dave Ehlinger, Finance Director and James Mielke, County Administrator. Mr. Ehlinger advised the Board that a copy of the presentation was placed on their desks. Mr. Ehlinger presented the Board with a High Level COVID-19 Fiscal Effect Recap for years 2020 and 2021. Question by Supervisor Derr answered by Mr. Ehlinger and Abby Sauer, Public Health Officer.

<u>COVID -19</u>: The Dodge County response to COVID-19 is approaching sixth months. Dodge County departments have remained open and staffed during the entire period. This is a credit to the employees who serve the public each and every day. To maintain appropriate social distancing most committee meetings continue to be held in the Administration Building Auditorium.

As an employer, Dodge County is subject to Governor Evers July 30<sup>th</sup> Executive Emergency Order #1 Requiring Face Coverings. Signage related to face coverings has been added to the various county building entry points. Overall, voluntary cooperation with the July 30<sup>th</sup> Executive order has been very good. As anticipated internally, full compliance has yet to be achieved.

COVID -19 has led to a couple of notable postponements. The Wisconsin Counties Association Annual Conference scheduled for September 20 -22<sup>nd</sup> has been postponed. The Harnischfeger Fallfest originally scheduled for Saturday September 26<sup>th</sup> has been cancelled.

**2021 Budget**: Monday August 17<sup>th</sup> is the due date for department budgets to be submitted to the Administrator. Preliminary 2021 budget discussions involving Finance Director Dave Ehlinger, department heads, financial staff and me have taken place with the following departments: Sheriff Office, Highway, Clearview, Human Service & Health, Courts, Child Support, Information Technology, and Land Resources & Parks.

Budgetary review is currently scheduled to be completed no later than September 9<sup>th</sup> followed by distribution to all county board members at the September County Board meeting. Tentatively the September Board meeting may be moved to Tuesday September 22<sup>nd</sup>. *A Special County Board Budget meeting is tentatively scheduled for Monday September 28<sup>th</sup>*. In discussion with the Finance Committee, the September 28<sup>th</sup> meeting will include individual department presentations of their preliminary budgets. The objective is to have an interactive, less formal discussion for receiving County Supervisor feedback, incorporate your recommendations and submit an updated budget document on October 20<sup>th</sup> for the November 10<sup>th</sup> Public Hearing.

The Highway Committee continues to review options for infrastructure funding. The committee is currently reviewing three potential borrowing options for addressing county infrastructure. Details along with a public survey are expected to be provided via a press release on or before Monday August 17<sup>th</sup>.

The preliminary 2021 -2025 Capital Improvement Plan was distributed to the Finance Committee on August 10<sup>th</sup>. The committee will review the Plan at their September and October meetings. An initial draft of the CIP plan will be distributed to all county board supervisors at the August 18<sup>th</sup> County Board meeting.

This memo is being written to provide historical and current information regarding Communicable Disease response through contract requirements with the State of Wisconsin. Dodge County Human Services and Health Department has been providing contact tracing efforts for a wide variety of communicable diseases for decades. Some of these diseases include, but are not limited to: Hepatitis A, B, C, Campylobacteriosis, Chlamydia, E-Coli, Gonorrhea, Giardiasis, Influenza, Salmonellosis, Meningitis, Syphillis, and Tuberculosis.

- 2018 460 contact tracing investigations, one nurse, \$6,000 in grant funding
- 2019 418 contact tracing investigations, one nurse, \$6,000 in grant funding
- January 1 July 31, 2020 632 contact tracing investigations; 427 of them being for COVID 19

In approximately March 2020, the virus known as COVID 19, was designated by the State of Wisconsin as a communicable disease with contact tracing requirements through local health departments. In recognition of the increased demands due to COVID -19 contact tracing required by the contract, the State of Wisconsin amended the Dodge County Human Services and Health Department contract to include additional dollars, not to exceed, \$870,023. The contractual obligation for contract tracing ends on December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2020. In accordance with the contract, Dodge County Human Services and Health must incur costs and submit costs for reimbursement. The Department is responsible for ensuring that all costs claimed against the grant dollars are for COVID 19 related expenses. The contract was reviewed by Kimberly Nass, Dodge County Corporation Counsel, on June 9<sup>th</sup>, 2020. The contract was signed on June 15<sup>th</sup>, 2020. This amendment is before you so this increased revenue can be reflected in the 2020 Human Services and Health Department budget.

These additional funds can only be used for activities related to COVID 19 including planning, testing coordination, and contact tracing. Dodge County is currently experiencing a significant increase in COVID 19 positive cases. During the week of August 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2020, Dodge County saw an average of 19 new cases each day. The Health Department is working 7 days per week to follow up on positive cases and are performing daily calls to individuals who are in isolation and quarantine. These numbers have risen each day. Currently Dodge County Human Services and Health employs five Public Health nurses. These employees have been dedicating their work day to follow up on COVID 19 cases. Additionally, 21 staff members employed by Dodge County Human Services and Health have been trained in contact tracing efforts. These employees have been working at least one day per week in the Health Department. Human Services and Health has been scheduling up to four additional employees per day to assist with Public Health efforts. These staff costs are reimbursable through the COVID 19 Response funding opportunity. Dodge County Human Services and Health Department is obligated to comply with contact tracing requirements set forth by the State of Wisconsin. These contract grant dollars will assist the Department in meeting the requirements of the contract and will offset county levy dollars.

# Resolution Authorizing the Engagement of Baker Tilly for Audit Services

**New Position Resolutions** 

Honorable Members of the Dodge County Board,

You have before you for consideration at your August 18, 2020 County Board meeting three resolutions from the sheriff's office. I have brought these resolutions to the Judicial and Public Protection (JPP) Committee for their consideration and they have approved all three resolutions for presentation at the County Board meeting. I would like to provide information for you on all three resolutions.

# Create 2 Jail Sergeants and elimination of 1 Jail Corporal

As you are all aware, a study was conducted in 2019 on the operations of the sheriff's office, which was conducted by Matrix. As part of that study, jail staffing was evaluated and it was found that the staffing of supervisory staff in the jail is inadequate to meet the needs of the facility. The recommendation for the 8-hour schedule which we are currently on is to increase the compliment of jail sergeants by four and reduce the jail corporals by two, a total net change of two additional authorized positions.

After the study was received by the county, the External Audit Review Committee took time to evaluate the Matrix report along with the Chief Deputy and I. That review took into consideration that there would be a considerable fiscal impact in adding all of the positions at once as outlined. It was determined that adding only two sergeants and eliminating only one corporal would be very beneficial in our organizational structure and it would alleviate some of the pressures on our supervisory staff. In evaluating this, it was clear that with this change, our supervisory staff would be able to supervise in a much more efficient and effective manner. The committee unanimously supported the addition of two jail sergeants and the elimination of one jail corporal. We are requesting that these positions be approved so that they can be considered for inclusion in the 2021 budget.

#### **Create 1 Deputy Secretary**

The Matrix study also identified that many duties are being completed by our jail sergeants and jail administration that are taking away from their ability to properly supervise staff. While all of our staff do an excellent job of overcoming this challenge, it would be ideal to transfer these

duties to a deputy secretary as it would be the most efficient for the operation of the jail and the sheriff's office as a whole.

Again, the External Audit Review Committee also met to review and evaluate this recommendation and unanimously supported the addition of this position.

We are requesting that this position be approved so that it can be considered for inclusion in the 2020 budget.

# **Elimination of 3 Communications Officers and Creation of 1 Communications Sergeant**

After the Matrix study was completed, I met with Matrix and was advised that we should evaluate 12-hour shifts throughout our agency as there are positives and negatives of all schedules and we should evaluate them to see what best meets our needs. While the Matrix report addresses the evaluation of 12-hour shifts in patrol and corrections, unfortunately, it is not mentioned in the report regarding communications. Regardless, we have conducted an internal study of a 12-hour shift in communications and we have determined that a conversion to the 12-hour shift will bring many efficiencies to the communications division that we had not had previously. As a result, the sheriff's office is planning to move forward with 12-hour shifts effective October 7, 2020, to realize these efficiencies as soon as possible. The approval of this resolution and tweaks to the sheriff's office current 12-hour shift policy at the Human Resources Committee will assist us in that migration.

Our communications team has been studying this transition and they presented it to staff before bringing the resolution to the JPP committee. The majority of our communications staff have indicated that they are in favor of this transition.

For your information, below are listed some of the many benefits that have been identified.

- Staff will change their pay period from a 75-hour pay period (37.5 hours per week) to an 84-hour pay period (42 hours per week). This will provide additional coverage in the communications center and will increase our minimum staffing from where it currently is providing much better 24/7 coverage than we have had in the past. Increase of 1,456 hours of coverage per year.
- Elimination of the 75-hour rounding rule based on a rotating schedule and employees will be paid for actual hours. This is a huge benefit for payroll and human resources.
- Staff will be on a 3 on 2 off, 2 on 3 off rotation providing them with every other weekend off and 62 additional days off each year. Currently, they are on a rotating schedule in which they only get a full 2 day weekend (Saturday and Sunday) off every 6 weeks.
- Studies have shown that 12-hour shifts greatly reduce absenteeism (sick time).
- Research of other agencies who are on 12 hour shifts shows a history of increased morale.
- Fewer commuting expenses for staff.
- Reduced overtime for shift shortages.
- 12 hour shifts are desirable to new hires. Communications positions have been difficult to fill across the nation and desirable shifts help to fill those vacancies.

- We currently have two vacancies in communications and this net change of two less authorized positions will not cause layoffs and will bring us to full staff
- This creates four shifts which will limit staff to working with a select group of employees. This will minimize spreading illnesses among staff and is a desirable work practice during the COVID-19 pandemic and other communicable illnesses.
- There will be built in overtime to this schedule due to a 42 hour work week. However, upon anticipated approval in the future of communications officers being added to the public safety FLSA exemption, in the future, that overtime will be eliminated and transitioned to time off bank. This proposal already reduces the overall personnel costs to our agency and when that federal law change is put into place, there will be an even greater savings to the overall budget of the sheriff's office.
- A quick poll of other sheriffs who have their dispatch on 12-hour shifts shows that of the sheriffs who responded, 23 other sheriffs have already made a similar transition.

There are certainly negatives to this schedule as well and we understand that, but the positives far supersede and outweigh the negatives. We request that this resolution be approved as there are four shifts to be staffed in a 12-hour schedule and we must have one sergeant assigned to each shift for proper supervision and oversight.

Again, we are scheduled to implement this schedule on October 7, 2020 and the approval of this resolution will greatly benefit the organizational structure of the sheriff's office. It will have a positive impact on the sheriff's office budget and most importantly, it will provide an even higher level of service to the citizens of Dodge County.

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF DODGE COUNTY, WISCONSIN.

WHEREAS, the Federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act included funding for local governments to cover unanticipated expenses relating to COVID-19 recovery; and.

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin Department of Administration is responsible for administering the funds; and.

WHEREAS, the Department of Administration has developed a program titled Routes to Recovery: Local Government Aid Grants and has allocated the available funds by governmental unit as described on Exhibit "A", attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference; and,

WHEREAS, Dodge County's allocation is \$1,463,699, which funds are available to Dodge County on a reimbursement basis upon the submittal of proof of payment for eligible expenditures; and,

WHEREAS, the Department of Administration has issued program guidance which includes eligibility criteria and program deadlines; and,

WHEREAS, the Dodge County Building Committee has identified a list of projects, equipment, and supplies and estimated costs of each project or purchase that meet the eligibility criteria as reflected on Exhibit "B", titled *Dodge County Routes to Recovery Projects*, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference; and,

WHEREAS, the projects, to the extent possible, will be administered following Dodge County's Procurement Policy; and,

WHEREAS, projects and purchases must be completed and invoices paid no later than November 6, 2020, in order to receive reimbursement from the allocation; and,

WHEREAS, given the compressed timeframe to access the Dodge County Routes to Recovery allocation, set forth on Exhibit "A", the Dodge County Building Committee recommends that the Dodge County Board of Supervisors authorize the identified projects to proceed forthwith and the purchases to be made, provided that program eligibility criteria are met and subject to Dodge County's allocation cap; and.

WHEREAS, the Finance Committee has reviewed the projects listed on Exhibit "B", and recommends that the Dodge County Board of Supervisors authorize the identified projects to proceed forthwith and the purchases to be made, and further recommends use of the funds from Dodge County's General Fund to pay for the projects, equipment, and supplies which will be replenished with *Routes to* Recovery funds;



Resolution Summary: Routes to Recovery Grant Program-Authorization to Proceed with County Projects and Purchases.



Routes to Recovery Grants provide \$200 million in flexible grants for local government's unbugeted expenditures incurred this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic, that have not already been covered through existing State of Wisconsin virus response efforts. Grants will cover reimburesments for:

- Emergency operation activities, including those related to public health, emergency services, and public safety response
- Medical and protective services and equipment, including PPE
- Cleaning, sanitizing, and other costs of COVID-19 mitigation in public areas and facilities, including those related to elections administration
- Temporary isolation housing for infected or at-risk individuals
- Testing and contact tracing costs above those covered by existing State programs
- Paid leave for public health and safety employees to take COVID-19 precautions
- Meeting local match requirements for expenses submitted for reimbursement by FEMA, to the full extent permitted by federal law
- Increased workers compensation costs due to COVID-19
- Purchases of services or equipment to facilitate telework by public employees

The determination of a local government's **Routes to Recovery Grant** amount is a formula based on the jurisdiction's population, as well as the priority of providing Wisconsin's units of local government no less than \$5,000, regardless of size of the population.

\$10million of **Routes to Recovery Grants** have also been set aside for Wisconsin's Tribal Partners.

An Ordinance amending the Land Use Code, Dodge County, Wisconsin.

Whereas the subject matter of this Ordinance has been duly referred to and considered by the Dodge County Land Resources and Parks Committee and a public hearing having been held, after the giving of requisite notice of said hearing and a recommendation thereon having been reported to the Board of Supervisors, Dodge County, Wisconsin as required by Section 59.69 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

Whereas the Dodge County Land Resources and Parks Committee has reviewed the proposed amendments to the Dodge County Land Use Code and has considered the facts presented at the public hearing relating to the subject matter of this Ordinance for compliance with the criteria listed in Section 2.3.3.I of the Dodge County Land Use Code.

Whereas the Dodge County Land Resources and Parks Committee has found that the proposed code amendments are necessary in order to correct certain errors in the Code and to meet the challenge of changing conditions, that the amendments are consistent with the Dodge County Comprehensive Plan and the stated purposes of the code and the amendments will not result in significant adverse impacts on the natural environment.

Whereas the Dodge County Land Resources and Parks Committee has found that the criteria listed in Section 2.3.3.I of the Dodge County Land Use Code can be met for this code amendment that is the subject matter of this Ordinance and has further found that said amendment will protect the health, safety, and general welfare of the general public.

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Dodge do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Be it resolved that the amendment to the Land Use Code, Dodge County Wisconsin as represented by "Exhibit A" attached to and made a part of this Ordinance be and hereby is approved and adopted, by the Board of Supervisors of Dodge County, Wisconsin.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with or in contradiction of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

# Proposed changes:

Additions in text are indicated by underline; deletions by single strikethrough.

- 1. Modify Section 1.4.4 and create Section 1.4.4.E as follows:
  - **1.4.4** No structure, land or water, shall hereafter be used and no structure, or part thereof shall hereafter be located, erected, moved, reconstructed, extended, converted or structurally altered without a Land Use Permit and/or a Conditional Use Permit, if required, except as allowed in Section 1.4.4.A through 1.4.4.E D, without full compliance with the provisions of this Code and all other applicable County and State Regulations.
  - **1.4.4.E** A Land Use Permit and/or a Conditional Use Permit shall not be required for the installation, construction, placement, operation, replacement or maintenance of a small wireless facility unless the small wireless facility is to be located within the jurisdictional boundaries of the Dodge County Airport Zoning Ordinance.
- 2. Modify the list of exceptions under Section 5.1.1 (street/highway/road setback provisions) to include an exemption for small wireless facilities as follows:

# 5.1.1 Street/highway/road/front yard setback for dwellings and other principal structures

Highway, street, road and front yard setbacks are measured from the centerline of the highway, street or road and/or from the highway, street and road right-of-ways whichever is greater.

Minimum setback distances for dwellings and other principal structures are provided in Table 5.1-1.

# **Exceptions:**

Essential Service Facilities and Private On-Site Waste Treatment Systems Surface, overhead, and underground essential service facilities and private on-site waste treatment systems (POWTS), but not including any buildings, towers, or antennas, may be located within any required setback on the condition that the owner of such facilities within any setback that abuts a street shall remove all

construction, additions, and replacements of these facilities at the owner's expense, when necessary for the improvement of the road, street, or highway.

**Underground structures** not capable of being used as foundations for prohibited above-ground structures may be located within setback lines, provided a setback agreement document requiring such structures to be removed at the owner's expense when required by road improvements is recorded with the Register of Deeds Office.

C-1 General Commercial Zoning District: Within the C-1 General Commercial Zoning District, in existing platted areas that are or previously have been in commercial use, interior lots served by public sanitary sewer shall have no minimum front or street yard. Corner lots shall have no minimum front or street yard on the yard facing the principal street and shall have a minimum 10 foot front or street yard on the yard facing the non-principal street (as the principal street is determined by the Land Use Administrator).

Access or service highways constructed according to plans as approved by the County Highway Committee may be located within highway setback lines. In giving such approval, the County Highway Committee shall consider highway safety and maximum sight distances.

Small Wireless Facilities may be located within the road right-of-way or within the required road setback on the condition that the owner of such facilities shall remove all construction, additions, and replacements of these facilities at the owner's expense, when necessary for the improvement of the road, street, or highway and on condition the owner of these facilities obtains all applicable road, street or highway permits that are necessary to authorize work within the road, street and highway right-of-way.

3. Modify Section 4.6.2 (Highway Setback Overlay District) to exempt small wireless facilities from the land use permit requirements as follows:

# 4.6.2 Structures Prohibited Within Setback Lines

- **4.6.2.A** No new structure or part thereof shall be placed, erected or structurally altered within 200 feet of the centerline of any highway, except as allowed under Section 4.6.2.B, without a Land Use Permit and without full compliance with the provisions of this code and all other applicable County regulations. All structures shall be located in accord with the minimum setbacks listed in Sections 5.1.1, 5.2.3 and Table 5.1.2 Section 5.1.2.E and Table 5.1.2-2 of this code except as provided for in Section 4.6.4 B.
- 4.6.2.B A Land Use Permit shall not be required for the installation, construction, placement, operation, replacement or maintenance of a small wireless facility unless the small wireless facility is to be located within the jurisdictional boundaries of the Dodge County Airport Zoning Ordinance.

- 4. Modify Section 4.9.1.C.6 and 4.9.1.E (Mobile Tower Siting and Radio Broadcast Service Facility Overlay District) as follows:
  - 4.9.1.C.6 These overlay district regulations are not intended to regulate small wireless facilities as defined in 66.0414 (1)(u) Wis. Stats.

#### 4.9.1.E Definitions

All definitions contained within s. 66.0404(1), and 66.0406(1) and 66.0414(1) Wisconsin Statutes are hereby incorporated in this Overlay District by reference.

- Modify Section 3.7.1.C as follows:
  - (Section 3.7.1 lists the allowed uses in the A-1 Prime Agricultural Zoning District)
  - **3.7.1.C** Existing nonfarm single family dwellings <u>and existing lots of record located</u> within the A-1 Prime Agriculture Zoning District that were legally established or permitted by the County <u>for non-farm residential use</u> prior to *June 28, 2010*.
- 6. Modify Section 6.2.9 (Chapter 6 Use Regulations) as follows:

# 6.2.9 Residential Development

# 6.2.9.A Design Standards in Residential Districts

In residential districts, the, <u>The</u> following design standards shall apply to all single-family and two-family dwellings, and to all manufactured housing units homes.

# 6.2.9.A.1 Exterior Materials

All dwellings shall have exterior siding and roofing that, in color, materials, and appearance, is compatible with the predominant materials in use on surrounding dwellings, or, if there is no predominance, is compatible with the exterior siding and roofing material commonly in use on residential dwellings in the community as a whole. The exterior walls of all structures, other than accessory structures, shall have a nonmetallic finish.

#### 6.2.9.A.2 Front Steps

The front steps to all dwellings shall be permanently installed and shall be constructed of concrete, masonry, or wood materials.

#### 6.2.9.A.3 Foundation

A manufactured housing units home used or intended to be used as an individual's place of habitation shall be placed on and shall be anchored or securely attached to an excavated and backfilled foundation that is enclosed by a permanent perimeter enclosure of masonry or concrete wall construction.

#### 6.2.9.A.4 Dwelling Area

A dwelling or manufactured home shall contain a minimum of 400 square feet of dwelling area. The dwelling area for this section shall be calculated using the outside dimensions of the dwelling or manufactured home. A deck or a patio shall not be included in the calculation of dwelling area.

#### 6.2.9.B Front Yards in Residential Districts

Deleted on (insert date)

Where lots comprising 40 percent of the frontage on a blockface in a residential district are improved with buildings, the required front yard shall be the average of the front yard depths for principal structures on each developed site in the same district on the blockface, or the minimum front yard setback, whichever is greater. Any residential lot fronting on a primary or secondary arterial shown on the streets and highways plan shall have a circular drive.

7. Create Section 2.2.13.D (general permit processing and scheduling provisions) as follows:

# 2.2.13.D State of Emergency – Processing and Scheduling timelines.

In the event a state of emergency is declared by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors in response to a public emergency which poses a threat to public order, life, health and safety of the citizens of Dodge County, processing and scheduling timetables listed in this Code for all applications shall be temporarily suspended until the emergency conditions cease to exist as determined by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors. During the declared emergency, the failure to meet processing or scheduling timetables specifically listed in this Code shall not result in deemed approvals.

8. Create Section 2.3.4.E.1 (rezoning scheduling provisions) as follows:

# 2.3.4.E.1 State of Emergency – Processing and Scheduling timelines for Public Hearings.

In the event a state of emergency is declared by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors in response to a public emergency which poses a threat to public order, life, health and safety of the citizens of Dodge County, processing and scheduling timetables for public hearings shall be temporarily suspended until the emergency conditions cease to exist as determined by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors. During the declared emergency, the failure to meet processing or scheduling timetables specifically listed in this Code shall not result in deemed approvals. A written agreement with the applicant to suspend the public hearing beyond the 45-day time limit shall not be required during a state of emergency.

9. Create Section 2.3.6.C.1 (conditional use permit scheduling provisions) as follows:

# 2.3.6.C.1 State of Emergency – Processing and Scheduling timelines for Public Hearings.

In the event a state of emergency is declared by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors in response to a public emergency which poses a threat to public order, life, health and safety of the citizens of Dodge County, processing and scheduling timetables for public hearings shall be temporarily suspended until the emergency conditions cease to exist as determined by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors. During the declared emergency, the failure to meet processing or scheduling timetables specifically listed in this Code shall not result in deemed approvals. A written agreement with the applicant to suspend the public hearing beyond the 45-day time limit shall not be required during a state of emergency.

10. Modify Section 5.1.7 (lot coverage provisions) as follows:

# 5.1.7 Lot Coverage for dwellings and other structures

Lot Coverage is that portion of a lot occupied by principal and accessory buildings and decks, but excluding at grade patios, walks and driveways. All structures, in aggregate, shall not exceed the following maximum lot coverages:

- **R-1 or R-2 Residential Zoning Districts** For lots located within the R-1 or R-2 Residential Zoning Districts there is no maximum lot coverage, however, no single accessory building shall exceed 1500 square feet in area.
- **R-3 Multi-Family Zoning District** The maximum lot coverage within the R-3 Multi-Family Zoning District shall be 35%
- **C-1 General Commercial Zoning District** The maximum lot coverage within the C-1 General Commercial Zoning District shall be 100%
- **C-2 Extensive Commercial Zoning District** The maximum lot coverage within the C-2 Extensive Commercial Zoning District shall be 50%
- I-1 and I-2 Industrial Zoning Districts The maximum lot coverage within the I-1 and I-2 Industrial Zoning Districts shall be 70%
- **A-1 and A-2 Agricultural Zoning Districts** The maximum lot coverage within the A-1 and A-2 Agricultural Zoning Districts shall be 10%

#### **Exceptions:**

Agricultural buildings located within the A-1 and A-2 Zoning Districts associated with an operating farm shall be exempt from the lot coverage provisions.

Ground-mounted solar energy collectors located within the Commercial, Industrial and Agricultural Zoning Districts shall be exempt from the lot coverage provisions of the Code provided the solar facility is designed to comply with the Stormwater management and Erosion Control provisions of this Code.

For existing lot coverage surfaces that were lawfully placed when constructed but that do not comply with the lot coverage area standards in this section, the property owner may maintain, modify, repair, replace or relocate existing lot coverage surface area with similar or different surface area provided that the project does not result in an increase in the percentage of lot coverage surface area that existed on the effective date of this Code. The lot coverage surface area exceptions in this section shall not be construed to supersede other provisions in this Code. All of the other applicable provisions of the Code still apply to new or existing development.

11. Modify Section 8.9.4.E (development standards for signs) as follows:

# 8.9.4.F Sign Location

(1) No sign permitted under this section shall be located in, on or above a public road right-of-way or navigable body of water, except for Official Public Signs. Any sign or sign supports constructed of concrete, mortar or stone shall comply with the minimum highway and road setback distances listed in-Section 5.1.2.E-Table 5.1-1;

12. Modify the "Exceptions List" in Section 5.2.3 (accessory structure road setback provisions) as follows:

Residential fences are permitted on property lines, but shall not in any case exceed a height of 4 feet in the front or street yard setback, and shall not be closer than 2 feet to any public right-of-way.

Security fences for commercial and industrial uses are permitted on the property lines in non-residential zoning districts but shall not exceed 10 feet in height, shall be of an open, non-opaque type similar to woven wire or wrought iron fencing, and shall not be closer than 2 feet to any public right-of-way.

13. Modify the "Exceptions List" in Section 5.2.5 (accessory structure rear yard setback provisions) as follows:

Residential fences are permitted on property lines, but shall not in any case exceed a height of 6 feet, shall not exceed a height of 4 feet in the front or street yard setback, and shall not be closer than 2 feet to any public right-of-way.

Security fences for commercial and industrial uses are permitted on the property lines in non-residential zoning districts but shall not exceed 10 feet in height, shall be of an open, non-opaque type similar to woven wire or wrought iron fencing, and shall not be closer than 2 feet to any public right-of-way.

14. Modify the "Exceptions List" in Section 5.2.8 (accessory structure height provisions) as follows:

Residential fences are permitted on property lines, but shall not in any case exceed a height of 6 feet, shall not exceed a height of 4 feet in the front or street yard setback, and shall not be closer than 2 feet to any public right-of-way.

Security fences for commercial and industrial uses are permitted on the property lines in non-residential zoning districts but shall not exceed 10 feet in height, shall be of an open, non-opaque type similar to woven wire or wrought iron fencing, and shall not be closer than 2 feet to any public right-of-way.

Modify Section 6.2.2 (Use standard provisions) as follows:
 6.2.2 Deleted December 15, 2009 (Moved to Section 4.2.5 of the Land Use Code)

# 6.2.2 Camping

No lot or parcel of land shall be used for camping unless the owner of the lot or parcel has received the required permits and approvals to allow a campground or recreational vehicle park use on said lot or parcel.

### 16. Modify Section 12 – Definitions as follows:

#### Access

<u>Driveway or other ways or means of vehicular and/or pedestrian approach, to provide physical entrance or exit to a property.</u>

### **Automobile Repair and Service**

The use of any site, building, structure, improvement, or land for the repair, overhaul, painting, assembling or maintenance of automobiles, motorcycles, trucks, trailers, or similar vehicles.

# **Camping**

The act of staying and/or sleeping in any outdoor area of land and/or water for one or more days or nights in a camping unit,

# **Motor Vehicle**

Any self-propelled vehicle designed for transportation of persons or goods along public streets or alleys or other public ways.

### Motor Vehicle - Inoperable

Any motorized vehicle incapable of immediately being driven and not properly licensed.

# Motor Vehicle - Abandoned

A vehicle that does not bear a current license plate unless said vehicle is stored within a completely enclosed building or unless it is stored on an approved sales lot. A vehicle shall be presumed abandoned under the following circumstances: 1) The vehicle is physically inoperable and/or is missing parts so that it is not maintained for driving; 2) The vehicle does not bear a valid license plate or current registration.

# Motor Vehicle Repair and Service

The use of any site, building, structure, improvement, or land for the repair, overhaul, assembling, painting or maintenance of motor vehicles.

# Motor Vehicle - Salvage and Storage Yard

Any land upon which 2 or more inoperable, abandoned or unlicensed motor vehicles are stored for more than 30 days unless said motor vehicles is/are stored within a completely enclosed building.

## **Public Way**

Any public road, street, highway, walkway, drainageway, or part thereof.

Any street, alley, pedestrian way, pathway, channel, viaduct, subway, bridge, easement, right-of-way, or other way in which the public has a right of use.

#### **Small Wireless Facility**

Small Wireless Facility means a wireless facility as defined in 66.0414(1)(u) Wis. Stats. Small Wireless Facility means a wireless facility to which all of the following apply (2019Wisconsin Act 14):

- 1. The wireless facility satisfies any of the following:
  - a. <u>The wireless facility is mounted on a structure 50 feet or less in height including any antenna.</u>
  - b. The wireless facility is mounted on a structure no more than 10 percent taller than any other adjacent structure.
  - c. The wireless facility does not increase the height of an existing structure on

which the wireless facility is located to a height of more than 50 feet or by 10 percent, whichever is greater.

- 2. <u>Each antenna associated with the deployment of the wireless facility, excluding associated antenna equipment, is no more than 3 cubic feet in volume.</u>
- 3. All other wireless equipment associated with the wireless facility specified above including the wireless equipment associated with the antenna and any preexisting associated equipment on the structure, is no more than 28 cubic feet in volume.
- 4. The wireless facility does not require registration as an antenna structure under 47CFR part 17.
- 5. The wireless facility is not located on tribal land, as defined in 36CFR 800.16(x).
- 6. The wireless facility does not result in human exposure to radio frequency in excess of the applicable safety standards specified in 47 CFR 1.1307.

# Vehicle Salvage and Storage Yard

Any land upon which 2 or more inoperable or unlicensed automobiles are stored for more than 30 days.

Any land upon which 2 or more inoperable, abandoned or unlicensed motor vehicles are stored for more than 30 days unless said motor vehicles are stored within a completely enclosed building.

# Wireless Facility

"Wireless facility" means an antenna facility at a fixed location that enables wireless services between user equipment and a communications network, and includes all of the following:

- 1. Equipment associated with wireless services.
- 2. Radio transceivers, antennas, or coaxial, metallic, or fiber-optic cable located on, in, under, or otherwise adjacent to a utility pole or wireless support structure.
- Regular and backup power supplies.
- 4. Equipment that is comparable to equipment specified in this subdivision regardless of technical configuration.

#### "Wireless facility" does not include any of the following:

- 1. The structure or improvements on, under, or within which equipment specified in subd. 1. is collocated.
- 2. Wireline backhaul facilities.
- 3. <u>Coaxial, metallic, or fiber-optic cable that is between utility poles or wireless support structures or that is not adjacent to a particular antenna.</u>

Whereas the Dodge County Land Resources and Parks Committee has reviewed the proposed amendments to Chapter 30.04(4)(b) of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances and has considered the facts presented at the public hearing relating to the subject matter of this Ordinance for compliance with the applicable provisions of the Dodge County Sanitary Ordinance and Section 59.70 (5) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

Whereas, Section 30.04(1) of the Code of Ordinances, Dodge County, Wisconsin, requires a forfeiture for a conviction for a violation of any of the ordinances.

Whereas, Section 30.04(4)(b) of the Code of Ordinances, Dodge County, Wisconsin, sets forth the schedule of deposits required for various ordinance violations, including ordinances with a statutory counterpart; and,

# 2.3.10.D.4 Citations

<u>Pursuant to ss.66.0113, Wis. Stats., the County may use the citation method of enforcement of ordinances, including those for which a statutory counterpart exists.</u>

#### 2.3.10.D.5 Other Remedies

The County shall have such other remedies as are and as may be from time to time provided by Wisconsin law for the violation of this Code.

#### 2.3.10.D.6 Other Powers

In addition to the enforcement powers specified in this Code, the County may exercise any and all enforcement powers granted by Wisconsin law.

# 2.3.10. D.7 Penalties

Any person, firm, or corporation who fails to comply with the provisions of this Code shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 dollars and costs of prosecution for each violation. In default of payment of such forfeiture and costs, violators shall be imprisoned in the County Jail until payment thereof, for a period not to exceed 6 months.

Amend Section 2.3.11.A (Enforcement Procedures – Non-Emergency Matters) as follows:
 2.3.11.A Non-Emergency Matters

In the case of violations of this Code that do not constitute an emergency or require immediate attention, the Land Use Administrator shall give notice of the nature of the violation to the property owner or to any other person who is party to the agreement or to any applicant for any relevant permit in the manner hereafter stated, after which the persons receiving notice shall have 30 days to correct the violation before further enforcement action shall be taken. Notice shall be given in person, by United States Registered or Certified Mail, or by posting notice on the premises. Notices of violation shall state the nature of the violation and the time period for compliance and may state the corrective steps necessary and the nature of subsequent penalties and enforcement actions should the situation not be corrected.

Failure to comply with the 30 day order will be considered a violation of the Dodge County Sanitary Ordinance.

Extensions to the 30 day orders may be granted at the discretion of the Department, provided good faith efforts are being made to correct the problem.

If the violation is not corrected within the time period specified in the order, the owner may be subject to:

- a) The issuance of an enforceable citation; and/or
- b) Commencement of legal action against the owner seeking an injunction to abate the violation and/or correct the damage created by the violation:
- c) Any and all other enforcement powers specified in this Ordinance and any and all enforcement powers granted by Wisconsin law.
- 5. Amend Section 2.3.11.B (Enforcement Procedures Emergency Matters) as follows:

# 2.3.11.B Emergency Matters

In the case of violations of this Code that constitute an emergency as a result of health, safety or public concerns or violations that <u>require immediate attention or violations that will</u> create increased problems or costs if not remedied immediately, the County may use the enforcement powers available under this chapter, <u>including the issuance of an enforceable citation</u>, without prior notice, but the Land Use Administrator shall attempt to give notice simultaneously with beginning enforcement action. Notice may be provided to the property owner, to any other person who is party to the agreement, and to applicants for any relevant permit.

Violations that are considered by the County as constituting an emergency as a result of health, safety or public concerns or as a violation that requires immediate attention or a violation that will create increased problems or costs if not remedied immediately include, but are not limited to, the following violations:

- a) Pumping sewage from a holding tank, septic tank, pump chamber, cesspool or other POWTS component onto the ground surface, into waters of the State or into an unauthorized area.
- b) The discharge of sewage onto the ground surface and/or into the waters of the state.
- 6. Create Section 2.3.13 through 2.3.13E Citations as follows:

# **2.3.13** <u>Citations</u>

# 2.3.13.A. Information Required. The citation shall contain the following:

- 1) The name and address of the alleged violator.
- 2) Factual allegations describing the alleged violation.
- 3) The time and place of the offence.
- 4) The section of the ordinance violated.
- 5) A designation of the offense in such manner as can be readily understood by a person making a reasonable effort to do so.
- 6) The time at which the alleged violator may appear in court.
- 7) A statement which, in essence, informs the alleged violator, as follows:
  - a. A cash deposit of a specified amount may be made which shall be delivered or mailed to the Clerk of Courts prior to the time of the scheduled court appearance.
  - b. <u>If such deposit is made, the alleged violator need not appear in court unless</u> he is subsequently summoned.
  - c. If such deposit is made and the alleged violator does not appear in court, he will be deemed to have tendered a plea of no contest and submitted to a forfeiture, plus costs, fees and surcharges, imposed under Ch. 814, Wis. Stats., not to exceed the amount of the deposit, or will be summoned into

- <u>court to answer the complaint if the court does not accept the plea of no</u> contest.
- d. If no deposit is made and the alleged violator does not appear in court at the time specified, the court may issue a summons or a warrant for the defendant's arrest or consider the nonappearance to be a plea of no contest and enter judgement under ss. 66.0113(3)(d), Wis. Stats., or the municipality may commence an action against the alleged violator to collect the forfeiture, plus costs, fees and surcharges, imposed under Ch. 814, Wis. Stats.
- 8) A direction that if the alleged violator elects to make a cash deposit, the statement which accompanies the citation shall be signed to indicate that the statement required under Subsection B(7) above has been read. Such statement shall be sent or brought with the cash deposit.
- 9) Such other information as the County Board deems necessary.

# 2.3.13.B Deposits

- 1) Each citation issued under this section, except those to which Subsection 2.3.13.B 4) below applies, shall specify a cash deposit as set forth in the Dodge County Code of Ordinances, Chapter 30.04(b) schedule of cash deposits where applicable, which is hereby adopted by reference, which consists of the appropriate forfeiture, the current penalty assessment, the jail assessment, the automation fee and the court support service fee.
- 2) The deposits shall be made in cash, money order or check to the Dodge County Clerk of Courts, who shall provide a receipt therefor.
- 3) The penalty assessment, the jail assessment, the automation fee and the court support fee shall be added to all forfeitures hereunder.
- 4) The deposit, including costs, pertaining to any minor receiving a citation under this section shall in no event exceed the maximum penalties provided in Ch. 938, Wis. Stats., Juvenile Justice Code, plus the penalty assessment, the jail assessment, the automation fee and the court support service fee, except that costs and penalties shall not be assessed against minors unless Wisconsin Law so provides.

# 2.3.13.C Deposit Schedule

1) Any law enforcement officer issuing a citation for any violation of this Ordinance shall indicate on the citation the amount of the deposit, as provided in Subsection B above, that the alleged violator may make in lieu of court appearance.

# 2.3.13.D Issuance of Citation

- 1) Any sworn Sheriff's Deputy may issue citations authorized under this section.
- 2) The following County officials may issue citations with respect to those specific sections of this Ordinance which relate to their official duties:
  - a. <u>Land Resources and Parks Director, Manager of Code Administration, Land Use / Sanitation Specialists</u>

# 2.3.13.E Procedure

1) Section 66.0113(3), Wis, Stats., relating to a violator's options and procedure on default, is hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

# 2.3.13.F Nonexclusivity

1) The issuance of a citation hereunder shall not preclude the County Board from adopting any other ordinance or providing for the enforcement of any other law or ordinance relating to the same or other matter.

- 2) The issuance of a citation hereunder shall not preclude the County or any authorized officer from proceeding under any other ordinance or law or by any other enforcement method to enforce any ordinance, regulation or order.
- 7. Modify the following definitions in Section 3 as follows:

#### Committee

The Dodge County Planning, Development Land Resources and Parks Committee or any successor Committee duly charged by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors with general planning responsibilities under Wisconsin Statute 59.97.

# Failing private onsite wastewater treatment system (POWTS)

Failing private onsite wastewater treatment system has the meaning specified under s. 145.245 (4) Stats.

Note: Section 145.245 (4) reads: Failing private sewage system means a private sewage system which causes or results in any of the following conditions:

- a. The discharge of sewage into surface water or ground water;
- b. The discharge of sewage into zones of saturation which adversely affects the operation of a private sewage system;
- e. The discharge of sewage to a drain tile or into zones of bedrock;
- d. The discharge of sewage to the surface of the ground;
- e. The failure to accept sewage discharges and backup of sewage into the structure served by the private sewage system.

A failing private on-site wastewater treatment system is one which causes or results in any of the following conditions:

- (a) The discharge of sewage into surface water or groundwater.
- (b) The introduction of sewage into zones of saturation which adversely affects the operation of a private on-site wastewater treatment system.
- (c) The discharge of sewage to a drain tile or into zones of bedrock.
- (d) The discharge of sewage to the surface of the ground.
- (e) The failure to accept sewage discharges and back up of sewage into the structure served by the private on-site wastewater treatment system.

#### **Municipality or Municipal**

The county, city or village governmental units enacting, administering and enforcing this zoning ordinance.

#### Sewage

Sewage means wastewater containing fecal coliform bacteria exceeding 200 CFU, colony forming units, per 100 ml.

Sewage means the water-carried wastes created in and to be conducted away from residences, industrial establishments, and public buildings as defined in s. 101.01(12) Wis. Stats, with such surface water or ground water as may be present.

- 8. Replace the term "private onsite wastewater treatment system" that is used throughout the Ordinance with the term "POWTS": Modify Section 2.3.4.J as follows:
- 9. Modify Section 2.3.4.J Transfer of Ownership as follows:

A sanitary permit may be transferred from an owner to a subsequent owner, pursuant to s 145.135(1) 145.19(8) Wisconsin State Statutes. The transfer shall be processed in accord with SPS 383.21(4) Wisconsin Administrative Code.

# 10. Modify Section 2.3.5.B.2 as follows:

**2.3.5.B.2** The owner of a POWTS or the owner's agent shall comply with the reporting requirements of SPS-385.55 383.55 Wis. Adm. Code. In addition to the reporting information required under SPS-385.55 (3) 383.55 (3) Wis. Adm. Code, the report shall include water meter readings or the metering device for each servicing event. In the case of licensing under s. 281.48(3)(d) Stats, the owner shall submit the report to the County. The County may enter upon the property to investigate the condition of the holding tank when pumping reports and/or meter or monitoring device readings may indicate that the holding tank is not being properly maintained.

# 11. Modify Section 2.3.6.C as follows:

# 2.3.6.C Reporting Requirements

The owner of a POWTS or the owner's agent shall comply with the reporting requirements of SPS 385.55 383.55 Wis. Adm. Code.

We, the Dodge County Land Resources and Parks Committee, hereby report favorably on the petition of Glen Bonner requesting amendment of the Land Use Code, Dodge County, Wisconsin, to rezone approximately 2.24-acres of land from an A-1 Prime Agricultural Zoning District to an A-2 General Agricultural Zoning District in part of the NW ¼ of the NW ¼, Section 13, Town of Trenton, to allow for the creation of a non-farm residential lot and recommend adoption of the attached ordinance.

The committee has reviewed and considered the facts presented in the application and received at the public hearing and finds that the criteria listed in Section 2.3.4.I of the Dodge County Land Use Code can be met for this proposal. The committee finds that the proposal is substantially consistent with the Dodge County Comprehensive and Farmland Preservation Plans and is consistent with the stated purposes of the Dodge County Land Use Code. The committee finds that the proposal will not result in significant adverse impacts upon the surrounding properties or the natural environment and further finds that the land proposed for rezoning is suitable for development and will not cause unreasonable soil erosion or have an unreasonable adverse effect on rare or irreplaceable natural areas. The committee finds that the proposal will not significantly impair or limit current or future agricultural use of the adjacent properties. The committee finds that the proposal will not be used to legitimize or spot zone a nonconforming use or structure and finds that the rezoning is the minimum action necessary to accomplish the intent of the petition.

Whereas the Dodge County Land Resources and Parks Committee has found that the criteria listed in Section 2.3.4.I of the Dodge County Land Use Code can be met for this proposal and has further found that the proposal is substantially consistent with the Dodge County Comprehensive Plan and the stated purposes of the Dodge County Land Use Code. Furthermore, this Committee has found that the proposal will not result in significant adverse impacts upon the surrounding properties or the natural environment, that the land proposed for rezoning is suitable for development and will not have an unreasonable effect on rare or irreplaceable natural resources, that the proposal will not significantly impair or limit current or future agricultural use of the adjacent properties, be used to legitimize or spot zone a nonconforming use or structure and that the rezoning petition is the minimum action necessary to accomplish the intent of the petition.

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Dodge do ordain as follows:



AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2, *THE GOVERNING BODY*, SECTION 2.01 – *COUNTY BOARD RULES*, OF THE DODGE COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES.

The people of the County of Dodge, represented by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors, do hereby ordain as follows:

**Section 1.** On August 3, 2020, the Dodge County Executive Committee recommended an amendment to Section 2.01 – *County Board Rules*, of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances modifying Rules 4 and 6 and eliminating Rule 36.

**Section 2.** In lieu of the publication of a pamphlet after the adjournment of each session per § 59.14(2), Wis. Stats., the county board minutes, including a summary of all resolutions and ordinances, will be published as a Class 1 notice within 60 days of each county board meeting, thereby eliminating the need for Rule 36.

**Section 3:** Rules 4 and 6. Based on the definition of "session" in Rule 35, it is proper to replace "session" with "meeting" in Rules 4 and 6.

**Section 4:** Section 2.01 of the Dodge County Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

# Section 2.01(4), RULE 4. (Am. #14-1; #17-102)

Whenever a meeting of the Dodge County Board of Supervisors is to be held in a certain month, it shall be held on the third Tuesday of said month at 7:00 p.m., unless the County Board shall designate another date for the meeting, and, except if necessary to avoid a conflict with the primary election, the February Meeting shall be held on a date to be determined by the County Board Chairman at 7:00 p.m., and the Organizational Session Meeting shall be held on the third Tuesday in April, at 9:00 a.m., and the Annual Budget Meeting shall be held on the Tuesday after the second Monday of November at 9:00 a.m. When the day of the Annual Budget meeting falls on November 11th, the Annual Budget Meeting shall be held on the next succeeding day. The order of business to be followed at the meetings of the Dodge County Board of Supervisors shall be as follows:

- 38 (a) Call to Order by the Chair.
- 39 (b) Roll Call by the County Clerk.
- 40 (c) Approval of the Minutes of the last meeting.
- (d) Communications on file with the Board.

- 1 (e) Unfinished business.
- 2 (f) Resolutions.
- 3 (g) Bills on file to be acted upon.
- 4 (h) Reports on file.
- 5 (i) Ordinances.
- 6 (j) Petitions.
- 7 (k) Claims.

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(I) Recess or Adjournment.

# Section 2.01(6), Rule 6. (Am. #17-102)

The County Clerk shall compile an agenda for each meeting of the County Board of Supervisors. Whenever possible the County Clerk shall mail or deliver to each Board Member, a copy of such agenda. This agenda, and a copy of each Resolution, Ordinance, and any other pertinent material, shall be mailed or delivered whenever possible by the Clerk to each Board Member by the Friday prior to the Board Meeting. The County Clerk may, by not later than 24 hours prior to a scheduled meeting of the Dodge County Board of Supervisors, add items to an original meeting agenda or to an amended meeting agenda, and shall comply with all notice provisions of the Open Meeting Law of the State of Wisconsin. If the County Clerk, on the day that the agenda for a particular County Board Session Meeting is to be mailed, determines that there is insufficient business to warrant holding such session meeting, he/she will immediately confer with the County Board Chairman. If it is agreed that the session meeting should not be held, the Clerk will immediately notify each Board Member of such decision.

# Section 2.01(36), RULE 36. (Am. #14-1; #17-102)

36. Soon after the County Board adjourns a session each year, the Board shall have its proceedings published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County and shall also have a reasonable number of copies, as determined by the County Clerk, of the proceedings printed in pamphlet form and available by not later than 60 days following said adjournment, pursuant to §59.14(2) and (3), Wis. Stats.
