Judge Snow comments regarding positive feedback of Moral Reconation Therapy.
- 6. MAT's in Drug Court and in Jaik: Tabled Discussion from August 30, 2022. Judge Snow inquires regarding Medical Assisted Treatment in the jail. Sheriff Schmidt responds that the provider that is contracted to provide care in the facility does not allow the use of narcotics while in custody. Corporation Counsel Kim Nass responds that treatment needs should be individualized. Becky Bell mentions vivitrol option and states only 6 total uses in 2021. Sheriff adds that inmates are given Narcan upon discharge.
- 7. Identifying Veterans in Dodge County's Criminal Justice System: Tabled Discussion from August 30, 2022. Judge Snow asks the committee about how our departments can go about finding non-self-reporting veterans in the criminal justice system. Discussion regarding which department, if any, have all the necessary information to be able to submit for a veterans search. County Administrator Cameron Clapper recommends speaking with the Dodge County VA Office. Kim Nass and Judge Snow will begin the process of looking into whether or not this type of identifying veterans would be feasible.

#### Program Changes/Notes:

- 1. The open Case Manager position has been filled. He began in September and has successfully completed the required trainings to begin taking on participants. He will be the TAP case manager. The previous TAP case manager transitioned into DTC and IDC.
- 2. The IDC and DTC Case Managers attended the Addressing Stimulant Use in Wisconsin training in Madison put on by Richard Rawson and Albert Hasson. The training covered: Evidence-based Treatments for Individuals with Stimulant Use Disorder, treatment for individuals who use stimulants (TRUST) protocols and approaches, other evidence-based behavioral strategies, including Motivational Interviewing, Community Reinforcement Approach, Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and Physical Exercise. An Overview of Contingency Management: An Essential Treatment Approach for Individuals with Stimulant Use Disorder, As well as Critical Clinical Challenges: Recruitment, Engagement and Retention
- 3. Alisha Nelson and Bob Barrington presented on Drug Treatment Court and Impaired Driving Court at the Citizen's Academy on November 2nd.
- 4. The 2023 TAD grant application was submitted to the state. In it we outlined a request for additional funding to increase staff salaries and send more team members to the National and state conferences.
- 5. MRT (Moral Reconation Therapy) is going well and 9 individuals have completed it successfully. There are now an additional 7 participants engaged in programming.
- 6. The TAP census continues to be low with only 1 active participant. DTC referrals that are assessed lower risk/lower need have been recommended for TAP programming as a way to increase the census and adequately serve the population needs.
